

STILL A MYSTERY.

Nothing Further Develops in the Donkel Case.

Nothing new has developed in the Donkel murder case. As we said in our last issue the case bids fair to remain a mystery. Cleveland Donkel is in Prineville in the sheriff's custody; why he is held is not a matter of public information as yet, although a very few ultra-sensational and uncharitable persons have given way to expressions that may cause them embarrassment in the future. There is no current belief in this town that Cleveland Donkel knows anything more of the fate of his father than has been stated in this paper. He is a boy eighteen years of age who has ridden much after cattle and horses, has always been fairly industrious and has never shown any traits that would cause a just minded person to suspect him of the horrible crime of parricide.

The murdered man had for some years struggled against a taste for intoxicants. Liquor rendered him almost insane, and last July he asked dealers in liquors not to sell him any and since that time he had lead a commendable life. His weakness was more to be pitied than blamed. While under the influence of liquor he was quarrelsome, especially toward his family, but his family seems to have borne with him during these periods, however trying and dangerous he may have been. It is a very serious thing to express suspicions that may put a fellowman on trial for his life and especially where the evidence is so paltry as that against Cleveland Donkel. A local paper distorts the evidence so as to make the boy appear guilty—why, we do not know.

Cleveland Donkel left his father at the camp at Pelton's barn on Monday. On the succeeding Friday night it is said a great camp-fire was seen at the scene of the murder by two reliable and truthful witnesses. On the next day, Saturday, this fire was still burning and was extinguished by another person who found the fire spreading to the camp shed. On the Friday night when this fire was obscuring the burial place of the murdered man, Cleveland Donkel is said to have been nearly forty miles away. The officers, when here, expressed themselves as impressed with the straightforward character of the boy's account of himself. As yet the mystery is unsolved and bids fair to remain so.
