Socialism is getting a strong hold on Australia. It is not an unmixed blessing. The railroads are owned by the government and the employees of the systems are continually scheming for advantages. The organization of employees is a pretty close corporation. Some districts get railroads where there is no business for them, while many districts needing them are given none. A district must be right politically in order to be favored with a road. Some of the railroads built had to be abandoned. The party in power uses the construction of railroads as a bribe for political support and thus makes a campaign fund of government revenues. Perfect honesty and unselfishness among men would render socialism successful, but it would do the same with any other form of government. The spirit and sense of honor of a people is the only guarantee of justice. No political form can be invented that will bear fruit without these. It's always and always "the man behind the gun."

Our naval officers are developing a style of literary composition—one that is worthy of comparison with Paul Jones' answer to a British officer's request for surrender—"We haven't begun to fight yet." Dewey reduced a remonstrance to the German admiral at Manila to one sentence—"If you want a fight you can have it in five minutes." Now comes Admiral Cotton, who states his position to the Turk at Beirut as follows: I have no intentions, no policy and no blank cartridges." This is the style of talk that Canadians designate as bluff. Neither von Dietrichs nor the Turk seemed to regard the messages in that light.

Joseph Chamberlain is England's Jonah. He listened too intently to Cecil Rhodes when the latter laid bare his scheme for having England annex the African mines. England did the behest of Rhodes, but the cost was tremendous. Chamberlain brought on the war before he gave the country time to prepare for it. Now he is urging a duty on foodstuffs, except such as are obtained from British colonies. This proposition has a fair appearance but it is little more than a scheme to rehabilitate the landowners of Great Britain and give them their old-time wealth and power over the working people.

Although Hitecock may be deprived of the aid and comfort of ex-Congressman Moody, he can still thank God that A. R. Greene remains. "Hitch" ought to take Greene out of Oregon and save him from being contaminated by "these here ornery" Oregonians.

Moody's indictment will give his friends a wide field for showing their fertility in the line of explanations.

Reports from the East would indicate that a wave of depression is in progress. Strange to say, the timber districts are as much affected

as any other part. It was supposed that these parts, where so much money had been made in the last several years, were in the best possible financial condition, yet it seems that the profits were taken out of the lumber districts for investments in other parts of the country and these investments are not paying dividends and some of them are so located that they are not available as collateral.

WILL HAVE HIS DAY IN COURT.

Malcom A. Moody, one time congressman from this district, will be tried by a Federal jury Nov. 16, on the serious charge of tampering with the mail of a Mrs. Conroy. Moody was permitted to explain his action to the grand jury but they evidently disbelieved him and found an indictment against him.

The story of the transaction seems to be as follows: Moody was interested in a bank which failed in 1897. Among its depositors was a Mrs. Conroy who had placed in the bank \$2000.00 which she had received as insurance on her husband's life, he having been killed in a railroad wreck. Mrs. Conroy was left a widow, with two children, at the age of twenty-one. The controller of the treasury at Washington sent to Mrs. Conroy at The Dalles a receipt to be signed by her upon which she was to receive a final dividend of \$320.25. Mrs. Conroy was then living at Portland and it is alleged that Moody procured the letter from The Dalles postoffice under the pretense of readdressing it. That instead of doing so he wrongfully opened it and extracted the receipt and settled with Mrs. Conroy for \$92.00 less than she had coming to her. Mrs. Conroy later found out that she had been deceived and demanded and received the receipt back and returned the money paid by Moody. Moody claims that he opened the letter in Mrs. Conroy's presence and this she emphatically denies. Moody's method of obtaining the letter probably convinced the grand jury and they found a bill against him.

The ex-congressman lays the blame for the indictment at the door of his political enemies, yet it hardly seems probable that these enemies tampered with a Federal grand jury. The outcome will be awaited with interest by the residents of this congressional district.
