The story of the transaction seems to be as follows: Moody was interested in a bank which failed in 1897. Among its depositors was a Mrs. Conroy who had placed in the bank \$2000.00 which she had received as insurance on her husband's life, he having been killed in a railroad wreck. Mrs. Conroy was left a widow, with two children, at the age of twenty-one.

The controller of the treasury at Washington sent to Mrs. Conroy at The Dalles a receipt to be signed by her upon which she was to receive a final dividend of \$320.25.
