THE RAILROAD COMING.

Terminus Here Next Year--Metropolis of Central Oregon.

Railroad talk was quiet, Portland had not an inkling of what was coming; then E. H. Harriman made a few short remarks that sent Oregon's stock upward and no place in the state will rejoice over the news so much as this town. Harriman has said the word. We are to have a railroad. The Columbia Southern will have a terminus here in 1904 and one short year will see this place the metropolis of Central Oregon.

"Arrangements have been completed for the extension of the Columbia Southern Railroad into Central Oregon next year" were Harriman's words. The arrangements are not to be made. They have been made. The resources of this section that have long remained idle will soon be developed. Timber will be manufactured, dairying will boom and this place will be the most active live stock shipping point in all Oregon. It will have a large tributary country to supply with merchandise and there is every reason to expect an influx of capital and a large population. All traffic must come here from the south for a great distance. We are to be, not a simple railroad station, but, a railroad terminus. Harriman had other good news for Oregon and Portland. Better service is promised on all his lines. The steamship lines are to have more boats, and every railroad advantage will be given this state. Harriman has proven himself at once the friend of Oregon and a high-class railroad man.

REAL ESTATE IN DEMAND.

Decision to Build Railroad Works up Keen Interest in Lytle Townsite Lots.

Before the news of Harriman's announcement that it had been decided to extend the Columbia Southern next summer had reached Prineville Thursday, J. L. McCulloch, the townsite agent at that place had received a telegram from H. J. Blaesing, a prominent marble dealer of Portland, directing him to select a lot in the Lytle townsite and stating further that the purchase price for same (\$75.) had been remitted by mail. From advices we learn that interest manifested by Portland real estate men in this district is most intense. The lot selected for Mr. Blaesing is lot 15, block 14 in the residence portion of the new town.

Yesterday morning Mr. Reed made the following sales to parties who have begun to realize what the future of Central Oregon will be. Ferdinand Okerlund, of Norwich, N. Dak. took lot 20, block 10 for \$150. and lot 13, block 7 for \$100.

J. T. Undseth took lot 5, block 14 for \$100.
J. E. Reed selected lot 4, block 14 for \$100.

The Eastern Oregon members of the legislature should be the last ones to hope for the repeal of the portage road bill. Their constituents are locked behind the closed doors of the Cascades; their only exit to market is through exorbitant freight rates; their produce is delivered into the hands of the transportation trust and profits that should be applied to educating children, improving homes and laying up substance for future emergencies, go into the treasury of the trust. The portage road is in the hands of the people and the legislature should allow the commission created by the last session to proceed with the construction of it. If it is defeated, through the dexterity of the corporation attorneys now trying to overthrow it, the next logical move for Eastern Oregon is to ask for state division, in order that vital local questions upon which depend the development of this portion of the state, may be settled by the people interested.—E.
