The new Crooked river bridge is nearly finished. The structure is standing very bridge-like over the river which in a month will be at flood and dangerous. It is expected that the bridge will be opened to traffic in a week. Similar structures over old Crooked river and the Ochoco would be greatly appreciated by the citizens of Prineville and Crook county.

A change in the stage schedule was made, effective Dec. 21, as follows: Mail leaves Shaniko immediately after train, but not later

than 8:15 p. m., and is allowed 15 hours and 15 minutes for the trip to Prineville. The thrice-a-week stage to Haystack leaves Prineville at 11:45 a. m. instead of 9:45 as formerly, and the Crook twice-a-week service leaves here also at 11:45 instead of 9:45. It is thought that the new O. R. & N. schedule will make other changes in the stage time card when it goes into effect.—Review.

The president in his message, an extract of which was printed in these columns last week, wants congress to revise the timber and stone law, the commutation clause of the homestead act and the desert land law, to eliminate all chance of fraudulently acquiring title to public land. He does not set forth any method short of absolute repeal that will accomplish this purpose, but leaves the whole matter in the hands of congress to determine ways and means. Mr. Roosevelt seems much concerned about the disappearance of our public lands and wants to do something, he doesn't know what, to keep the lands rigidly for the homebuilder. Why not repeal all but the homestead act and give the whole business over to the scrippers? These laws are worthless because they can be got around; new laws can be framed that no one can get around, jump over, creep through or crawl under. Yes, of course; but it will take a man much smarter than President Roosevelt to find such laws and to put them on the statute books. The fact that he has nothing to suggest as a remedy is sufficient to indicate that he has no means, other than repeal, at hand to offer.—Prineville Review.
