The past several years have witnessed a gradual awakening of the public to a realization of the gigantic frauds that have been perpetrated in different branches of our national, state and municipal governments. Many people look upon the proceedings that have been taken to remedy the discovered evils as the work of partisans or the political enemies of those whose crookedness is being exposed. The fair-minded man must reach a different conclusion after he has viewed the situation. He cannot believe otherwise than that it is due to a demand from the people for honesty in the conduct of governmental affairs.

The Lakeview Examiner takes a somewhat pessimistic view of what the outcome of the inspection of the recent withdrawal might be. It states in its last issue that the inspectors who have been going over the withdrawal area will recommend that the lands be reserved permanently. This, of course, would work an immeasurable hardship on the people of Lake county and would also have a detrimental effect on this county. It is impossible to ascertain the grounds on which such a recommendation would be based and we are inclined to think that the Examiner has begun very early to shed a few unnecessary tears.

A fleet of American men-of-war under the command of Admiral Evans will be stationed in the Oriental seas during hostilities between Russia and Japan. Uncle Sam likes to have his bluejackets at hand wherever fighting is going on so that they might pick up ideas and learn more of the art of modern warfare. Whether Japan or Russia will be able to teach our men anything in this line remains to be seen.

Roosevelt has finally been given the proper hunch by the Oregon delegation in congress, and as a result, Secretary Hitchcock has been temporarily relegated to the rear while the President personally considers the recommendations of the delegation in the cases of Asa B. Thomson and J. H. Booth, both of whom would have lost their necks had the Hitchcock regime remained unbroken.

The United States Steel Corporation gave most of its army of employees a New Year's greeting in the shape of a cut in wages. The cut ranges from 5 to 30 per cent and affects over 150,000 men. On the other hand it is estimated that the trust will thereby increase its profits by a million dollars per year.

Congressman Mondell, of Wyoming is in the midst of the fight against the repeal of the Timber and Stone Act. The whole West is falling into line to fight the plans of the so-called reformers who see so much abuse in the land laws as they now stand.

## Right-of-Way Had Been Secured.

The Columbia Southern Railroad Company gained by the secrecy with which negotiations with Harriman were carried on a number of people, upon the announce-

ment of the termination of negotiations, filed on lands which they thought would be crossed by the road but the company had already secured its right-of-way.

## INHUMAN SELFISHNESS.

The labor unions of Chicago are making an exhibition of themselves. The dead are not permitted burial by union drivers, and the spectacle of an express wagon containing the corpse guarded by policeman, the sorrowing relatives menaced by a mob, is one which the fairminded American citizen must look upon with horror and contempt. Wolves in search of food could not do more. When union men become so ravenous for money that the last rites over the dead moves them to no emotion of pity or respect, they are cultivating a degree of coarse selfishness that makes them a veritable Frankenstein monster to society. Strikers of late years have not been hordes of starving men seeking to defend themselves against unscrupulous employes. The man who earned \$2 per day struck for higher pay, but so did the man who earned as high as \$6 per day. Were the pay of both of these classes doubled how long would it be before discontent would again set in? Who can say! If each striker of late years, should carefully examine himself as to his motive for striking not a few of them would find that a vacation from labor with an accompaniment of exciting rioting was the real motive upon which he acted.

At the present time any competent workman can earn a good living, can in a few years lay by sufficient money to tide him over seasons of want. Long ago men dreamed of a world with labor eliminated or almost so. From time to time they revolted from the workaday conditions in the world and after the mood for romance passed they met again the same old problem. Those who eat must work, is the command which nature lays upon mankind and those who have evaded the command have not been the noblest members of the human race. During the hard times of 1893 the farmer of Nebraska fed the Coxy Army silver miner from Colorado. If you were to figure up at that time the amounts of money which each had earned during the previous several years, the charity giver should have been the beggar, and the beggar the charity giver. The wage earner must acquire an ability to save his money or he can never become a free man. The ability to work is not sufficient. If it is ac-
