A petition asking for a daily mail service to Deschutes was signed by over two hundred patrons of the office. A petition some time ago asking for daily service from Prineville to Silver Lake was refused by the department, but there is sufficient mail to Deschutes to entitle it to daily service.

B. S. Cook has become sales agent of the Columbia Southern Ditch Co., and will soon bring a number of new settlers to the irrigated land. Mr. Cook intends to induce a number of settlers, who have had experience in irrigation to take up land and thus give inexperienced settlers the benefit of their knowledge.

Hugh O'Kane has purchased 80 head of horses from George Milligan. These horses are the best range horses in this section of the country and ought to make a number of very desirable teams, when broken. The demand for horses for ditch and railroad as well as the present demand for cavalry horses by the Japanese renders the horse market a good one. Mr. O'Kane is a practical horseman and will certainly turn out some excellent teams.

A man named McCormick, who has been employed by the ditch company for some time, started in at Bend to make a record as a bad man. He started matters by engaging in a fist fight in which he was not entirely successful. He later borrowed a gun for the purpose of killing his dog. He fired four shots, one of which struck the butcher shop, and the rest went equally wild, putting the neighborhood in danger. McCormick explained that he was not unwilling to die in battle, but he was finally disarmed. He has left town, probably for Manchuria.
