Farmers' Ditch Progressing.

Money for ditch stock is pouring into Butler & Co.'s bank in a manner very satisfactory to the managers of the Farmers' Irrigating company. The first note of \$10,000 was paid off a week before it was due, and money for the remaining notes will soon be on hand, Monday, N. C. Evans, secretary of the company, said he had just finished writing contracts for 50 of the stockholders. Many of the farmers had the ready cash to make payments for their stock, while the others find money lenders quite willing to advance loans on land that is to be irrigated.

The only bad feature is the continued rains which are delaying work on improvements to the ditch. Snow still covers the ground in places, and wherever excavating has to be done the ground is so saturated with water that work with horses would be impossible. Considerable repairing has been done on the lower laterals. As soon as the weather permits, N. C. Evans will run levels for straightening up the main flume. Lumber for repairs can be secured from Frank Davenport's Mount Hood saw mill, hauled to the head of the ditch and floated down as needed.—Hood River Glacier.
