### Feeling in the East.

W. E. Guerin, formerly of Columbus, Ohio, and later of Seattle, has arrived in the city from an extended trip throughout the east and to Europe, and is a guest of the Portland. Mr. Guerin built the Palmer cut-off on the Northern Pacific railroad, bringing the main line to Seattle, as president of the Seattle and San Francisco Railroad & Navigation company. This company afterward sold out its rights to the Northern Pacific.

Mr. Guerin said today that if either Parker of New York or Olney of Massachusetts is nominated for president by the democrats there is a very serious doubt of President Roosevelt's re-election. Mr. Guerin is a lifelong Republican himself. He said:

"In New York and generally throughout the east the feeling regarding the presidential election is far different from what it is on the Pacific coast. Out west the general belief is that Roosevelt will win in a walk. In the east, and particularly in New York, it is the opinion that either Olney or Parker will carry New York, which would make Roosevelt's re-election a very doubtful proposition.

"It is because of this fact that business generally in the east is quiet. There is no depression but money in New York, on the contrary, is as cheap as I have known it lately, call money being quoted at 1 per cent and commercial paper at from 3 1/4 to 4. Quiet times will prevail for probably a year or two. The large corporations are not spreading out any, and the production of the iron and steel mills has been seriously curtailed, owing to the fact that there is little building in progress.

"The west, in my opinion, is far more prosperous than the east."

Mr. Guerin is the father of R. F. Guerin, secretary and treasurer of the Deschutes Irrigation & Power company.—Oregon Journal.

### National Irrigation.

The national irrigation fund bids fair to be drawn on for Oregon's benefit during the next year, and Malheur county will see \$2,000,000 expended in reclamation of desert land. The choice lay between Umatilla and Malheur counties and the latter won. The amount to be expended does not by any means exhaust the part of the reclamation fund to which Oregon is entitled. The Malheur project involves the construction of a great dam and reservoir whereby the spring floods can be held for summer distribution. The Deschutes country is fortunate in being so far advanced with irrigation, and it will be well settled and have green fields long before the government is prepared to open the Malheur region to entry. Umatilla county may get government aid later on.

### Some Roosevelt Coms.

"New York has always had a low political standard, one or the other of its great parties and factional organizations, and often both or all of them, being at all times most unlovely bodies of excessively unwholesome moral tone."

"A class of professional non-combatants is as hurtful to the real healthy growth of a nation as is a class of fire eaters, for a weakness or folly is nationally as bad as a vice or worse, and in the long run a Quaker may be quite as undesirable a citizen as is a duelist. No man who is not willing to bear arms and to fight for his rights can give a good reason why he should be entitled to the privilege of living in a free community."

"I shall confine my remarks to what General Porter has said about patriotism. Patriotism comes first, and I hope you will not fail to display it next Tuesday. Mr. Bryan and his adherents have appealed to the basest set in the land, the farmers."

"The good men in such a case band themselves together as regulators and put down with ruthless severity by the exercise of lynch law, shooting and hanging the worst offhand. In many of the cases of lynch law which have come to my knowledge the effect has been healthy for the community, but sometimes great injustice is done. Generally the vigilantes, by a series of summary executions, do really good work, but I have rarely known them to fail, among the men whom they kill for good reasons, to also kill one or two either by mistake or to gratify private malice."

"In great crises it may be necessary to overturn constitutions, to disregard statutes, just as it may be necessary to establish a vigilance committee or take refuge in lynch laws."

### Strong in Wheeler County.

W. A. Booth, a former resident of this vicinity and well known here, has been nominated for state senator from the joint senatorial district composed of Grant, Klamath, Crook and Lake counties. Mr. Booth is a good clean upright man, and barring his politics we would as soon see him elected as any man on earth.—Mitchell Sentinel.
