The Oregon Legislature met at Salem last Monday. This week has been spent in organizing and getting ready for business. Smith has been elected speaker of the House and Simon presides over the Senate.

As effort is being made to have the town of Newberg incorporated at this session of the legislature. It requires a special act of the legislature to incorporate a town in this State and if this effort is not successful it will be two years before there is another chance.

Although Oregon has been settled for many years, the eastern people do not know and we ourselves are only beginning to wake up to the magnitude of its resources. We are at the beginning of the grandest period of prosperity the State has ever known.

THE STATE UNIVERSITY.

Excellent Advantages Offered for a Higher Education.

The University of Oregon, as this school is called, is an institution of learning where the state offers the advantages of a higher education than is afforded by the common schools under the state control.

The change of the name of the school is in the hands of a board of regents, consisting of twelve members, appointed by the governor and confirmed by the senate.

The faculty of the school includes nine teachers, with Prof. John W. Johnson, A. M., an instructor of great learning as president of the institution.

The library, through the efforts of the Hon. J. N. Dulph, has been made the depository of all the documents published by the general government at Washington.

CHOICE EXTRACTS FROM CONVENTION SPEECHES. National W. C. T. U., New York, Oct. 19-23. (Continued from last week.)

MARY A. LYONS. (Continued from last week.) that they were worsted in the battle, they called to their help the reserves, the women, and gave to them the right to vote.

How did I come, friends, to where we are? What is the W. C. T. U.? First of all, it is evangelical. There never was a revival lighting the world to a higher spiritual level that surpassed the Woman's Crusade.

As to the law in the different States and Territories there is nonuniformity: "The laws are silent in the following States: Vermont, Connecticut, New York, Virginia, Delaware, Georgia, Mississippi, Louisiana, Oregon, Texas, Michigan, Kentucky, Illinois, Missouri, Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, Arizona, Washington Territory.

The law of Massachusetts on the subject is as follows: "It shall be the duty of the teachers to use their best endeavors to impress upon the minds of the youth committed to their care and instruction, the principles of piety, justice and a sacred regard to truth, love to their country, humanity, and universal benevolence, sobriety, industry, frugality, charity, moderation, temperance, and those other virtues which are the ornament of human society, and the basis upon which a republican constitution is founded; and they shall endeavor to lead their pupils, as their ages and capacity will allow, into a clearer understanding of the tendencies of these virtues to preserve and perfect a republican constitution, and secure the blessing of liberty, as well as to prompt their own happiness, and also to point out to them the evil tendency of the opposite vice."

The school laws of West Virginia are explicit. "All teachers, boards of education, and school officers are hereby charged with the duty of providing that moral training for the youth of this State which will contribute to securing good behavior and manners, and furnish the State with exemplary citizens."

The school laws of Iowa are such that, "The Bible shall not be excluded from any school or institution of this State, nor shall any pupil be required to read it contrary to the wishes of his parent or guardian."

Mistakes of Parents. "One of our distinguished teachers says that, in the case of two thousand or more boys who have passed under his care, few parents have ever forgiven him if he said, 'Your boy is not quick or bright; but he is thoroughly pure and true and good.' They took it for granted that goodness could be attained in any old hour or age; but that brightness or quickness seemed of much larger importance. On the other hand, if the teacher said, 'Your boy learns every lesson, and recites it well; he is at the head of his class, and will take any place he chooses in any school; and, although he may have to wait, I wish you were as sure that he was honest, pure and good as I am sure that he is.'"

MISCELLANEOUS.

Two American boys made the acquaintance of the King of Denmark last summer, under very peculiar circumstances. They were skylarking in the streets of Copenhagen, and one boy tossed the other's hat into a tree.

A bill is before congress to appropriate \$1,000,000 to build a 90-inch lens telescope for Washington. This will be over a foot larger than that of the Lick observatory which brings the moon within 20 miles of the earth.
