Dr. Howard Crosby is authority for the statement that one of the captains of police in New York city made \$70,000 in one year by his carefulness in leaving lawbreakers alone.

A correspondent of the New York Christian Advocate states that 2,000 drunkards and opium smokers have been reformed in the last ten years through the influence of the New York Christian Home.

A Spanish tobaccoist at Gibraltar was recently fined two pounds or one month's hard labor for selling indecent French cigarette books. In pronouncing sentence the magistrate admitted that the punishment was inadequate but stated that it met the highest limit of the law. This is the first case prosecuted by the Gibraltar White Cross Union.

The California Censor adds one to the many facts deserving the attention of high license agitators. During the last two years of low license in Los Angeles the number of arrests for drunkenness was 2,471 the first year and 3,214 the second. The license fee was then raised from \$52 to \$600. The first year thereafter the number of arrests for drunkenness rose to 5,194 and the second year to 5,991.
