## CHINESE WINE-MAKING.

The Process Which Has Been in Use for Thousands of Years.

Wine-making is said to have existed for thousands of years before the introduction of distilling. The process is simple. Glutinous rice, hwang-mi, is placed over a fire in a large iron pan and softened with warm water. It is made into a thick, solid sort of a gruel. This steeped rice is placed on a table with raised edges to prevent the fluid rom overflowing. Over the rice, when n this state, the leaven to aid fermentation is sprinkled. The whole is then mixed an I mashed with an iron masher. and remains in a large stoneware jar or several days. If the wine is desired to be of a sweet taste, two days are enough; but for wine without sweet taste four or five days are required. To make the second kind of wine stronger, the Chinese brewer often adds spirit. After all this the wine, solid and liquid parts together, is placed in a cloth bag, and this goes into a pressing chest of wood, called cha, the wine press. A heavy stone presses it down and the wine flows out from a sort of a teapot pout in the side of the press. The renainder of the solid matter is called san, and is used to feed animals or as a ferment. The method of distilling

Friends' Pacific Academy is located at Newberg, Yambill county, Oregon, on the Portland and Willamette Valley railroad, twenty-two miles from Portland, and one mile from Rogers' Landing on Willamette river.

It was opened for pupils September 28th, 1885, and had enrolled during the first week nineteen pupils. The second school year began September 13th, 1886, with an enrollment of twenty-six, and the present school year opened September 12th, 1887, with an enrollment of fifty-one, and the winter term, December 3d, with an enrollment of 110.

At the time of the opening of the school only the Academy building was erected, and only the lower story of it was completed. During the summer of 1886 the boarding hall and three cottages for pupils bourding themselves were constructed, and during the summer of 1887 the hall for gymnasium and boys' dormitories was commenced and the Academy building was completed.
