**W. C. T. U. COLUMN.**  
**"For God and Home and Native Land."**

 Salt Lake City has a Loyal Temperance Legion in each ward.  
 A Woman's Christian Temperance Union is about to be organized in Oklahoma.  
 More than 700,000 liquor documents were lately sent to Pennsylvania by the National Liquor Dealers' Association.  
 The ladies of the New Zealand W. C. T. U. are raising funds to support an American organizer, who will give them her entire time for two years.  
 The superintendent of prison work in Topeka Kansas, estimates that she has spent more than forty days in jail distributing temperance literature and holding religious services.  
 Three presidents, Washington, Lincoln, and Harrison, are now on record as officially in favor of observing the "Sabbath"—President Harrison having banished Sunday drills from the army.  
 A special dispatch to the Chicago Tribune from Boston says that since the defeat of the Woman's License Suffrage bill brewers are less anxious to sell out their breweries. Why so unless Woman's ballot would mean prohibition?

 The county organization of the W. C. T. U. elected in Suffolk county, New York last June has grown from five unions numbering 130 members to twelve unions numbering 403 members. The W. C. T. U. is conceded to be the most powerful force of temperance in the country.  
 Though there is occasionally a liquor user who appears to enjoy good health and who goes on to ripe old age he is no more to be taken as a proof of the general harmlessness of drink than is the man who stands in the thick ca. nage of battle a proof of the general harmlessness of missiles of war.—Elisha Cheney.

**Friends Pacific Academy.**  
 Martin Luther said: "The strength of a town does not consist in its towers and bulwarks, but in counting a great number of learned, serious, honest, well educated citizens." The same may be said of a state or nation. The strength of the American nation does not consist in our fields of waving grain, our rich mineral resources, our orchards of fruit, our manufacturing interests or our standing army. All these may be essential to our existence as a nation, but these will fail unless they are accompanied by educated minds, cultured minds, minds disciplined by the "learning process" whether it be obtained in the schools, or by private study. And what is more, from the fact that our forefathers possessed these qualities will not answer our needs of today, and the needs of the future. William Penn saw these truths, and said, "men of wisdom and virtue are requisite to preserve a good constitution, and these conditions do not descend with worldly inheritance, but are to be carefully propagated by a virtuous education of the youth."  
 The Friends of Newberg recognizing all these principles to be true, in order to carry on their part of the great work of education in Oregon, founded in the year 1885 Friends' Pacific Academy. Postoffice's outfit for teaching consisted of himself, a simple room and the boys, but the world to day is reaping the results of his efforts. Socrates had still less for "the street corners served him for a classroom, and his terms always commenced when he could contrive a meeting between himself and another, and lasted often no longer than during that sitting. He had no blackboard, no chalk, never wrote a line; He taught only, and to such purposes that no other Greek left such a name. In our splendid buildings, our beautiful grounds, and our moral and intellectual town we certainly possess all the advantages that these great teachers had, but whether our institution succeeds in stamping itself upon the intellectual thought of the age or not, as these "great schools" did, depends upon the support and encouragement of the good men and good women of the town and country. However, Friends' Pacific Academy is no longer an experiment. Its right to exist now and in the future may be seen when we view the work which it has accomplished in the past. We make no apology for its existence. It exists because it has a right to exist, and because there is a rich field for action before it.  
 During the four years that the institution has been open for students many young people from different parts of the Willamette valley and other localities have availed themselves of the opportunities and advantages afforded by the institution. Many of these have received instruction which will not only make them more useful to the neighborhoods in which they live, but which will properly fit them for citizenship of a free republic. While the course is a regular Academic course, it has done valuable work in fitting young people for teaching. Eleven students who were in school during the Fall and Winter terms of last year, filled honorable places in the common schools in different parts of the state this summer.  
 The school is controlled and managed by the Friends' Church; but the instruction is non-sectarian. Knowing that the world's discipline is rigid, and knowing that young people must meet this sooner or later they are placed under strict discipline. Some forms of amusement and habits such as dancing, card playing, the use of tobacco etc. while they are indulged in by many who hold honorable and respectable positions in the world, are excluded from the school, since such influences have a deadly effect upon intellectual work. The outlook for the future prosperity of the school is bright. And we invite the attention of those who are desirous of finding a safe and cheap place to educate their children, to this institution.
