Commodity Report.
Below we give a report of the business
done at this station by the P. & W. V.
Railroad during the month of December.
Mr. Smith the agent says the month was
a dull one so far as the shipment of freight
is concerned and yet when our readers no-
tice the totals they will see that the Nar-
row Gauge is doing a good business.

There is no other point on the road ex-
cept Oswego that makes anything like
the showing of freight and passenger traf-
fic that Newberg does. The fact is the
amount of business furnished by our peo-
ple deserves better accommodations than
we get from the railroad Co. The freight
room is too small by half at least. As ev-
idence of this it is no uncommon thing to
see freight piled around the depot on the
platform in such a state of chaos that
passengers risk their necks in their efforts
to get on and off trains. The waiting train
room is so small that only about a dozen
passengers can be seated at one time and
the only warmth they get passes through
a three by four hole in the wall and comes
from a stove in the agents room. We
are not mentioning these things merely to
as a kick but when we consider that from
people place in the pockets of the railroad
Co. \$851.56 per month we feel that we can
justly ask Mr. Reid for better accommo-
dations.
