**THE RACE AROUND THE WORLD.**  
Between Nelle Bly and Miss Bisland—Who Will Win?  
SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—In little more than a week the race around the world between Miss Bisland of the *Cosmopolitan* Magazine and Miss Nellie Bly of the *New York World* will be over. Both left New York on November 14th, Miss Bly having a start of twelve hours and going east, while Miss Bisland went west. Five days later Miss Bisland reached here, while her rival was still on the Atlantic. Miss Bisland left San Francisco for the orient on the steamer *Oceanic*, losing two days here. Telegraphic advice states that she arrived at Paris yesterday morning, three hours too late to take the fast steamer to New York, so she rushed by train and connections to Queenstown to overtake the *Canader*, the *Bothnia*. Unfortunately the *Bothnia* is a slow boat. She can hardly make the run in less than ten days at the best, and, with the prevailing westerly gales, she may be twelve days in getting to New York. This will make Miss Bisland's time (supposing the *Bothnia* makes a ten days' passage) just seventy six days around the world.  
It is possible that Nellie Bly will reach here to-morrow, although the steamer from China on which she took passage is not due until Tuesday next. Two representatives of the *World* were sent out to meet her here, but they are snowed up on the Central Pacific. Her paper has ordered a special train to bear her eastward, at least for a part of the distance. If the blockade continues she will be forced to travel the southern route, it being on a par with Miss Bisland and her slow steamer. But if the blockade is raised, she will be able to reach New York on Monday, the 27th, winning the race and making the extraordinary record of seventy-four days.—Ex.
