Is the city election of Salt Lake City held a few days ago, the Gentiles carried the city by a handsome majority.

E. H. BELLINGER a prominent real estate man of Salem was drowned in that city early in the week while attempting to cross North Mill creek in a buggy.

ANDREW PICKETT, clerk of our school district has finished the enumeration and finds two hundred and seventy children of school age. Eight years ago a baker's dozen was about all that could be gathered into a school here. We challenge any point in Western Oregon to make a better showing.

WM. REID is quoted by the Hillsboro Independent as saying to a reporter of that paper that work on the bridge to be built across the Willamette at Rays Landing by the Southern Pacific Company will commence in less than sixty days. This looks like the S. P. Co. intended to wake up and make the Narrow Gauge a good road yet.

THE LOCKS at Oregon City were damaged by the high water to such an extent that they will probably not be opened for passage for a month. The "Champion" has been ordered to Canby with her cargo to lay until the locks are opened. The steamers "Orient" and "Modoc" are ordered to Salem to engage in the passenger traffic for the present.

IN ACCORDANCE with a call made by Gov. Penney the assessors of the different counties of the State met in Portland Wednesday to consider the propriety of recommending needed changes in our assessment laws. As every body knows that has paid any attention to the subject, the assessment laws on our statute books are in many ways defective and it is to be hoped that this meeting of the assessors will result in the bringing about of proper modifications of the law. As an evidence of the unequal assessment of property it was learned in this convention that mortgages are assessed at half their value in Columbia, Multnomah and Wasco counties; at two thirds their value in Baker, Clackamas and Morrow; at three fourths their value in Union and Washington; and at their full value in Grant, Umatilla, Yamhill and Sherman.

THE Telephone-Register in the account given of the escape of Judson from jail refers to him as one "who had been arrested in Newberg on complaint of the virtuous citizens of that city for indecent exposure." Several times we have heard that in certain quarters there were some who thought Judson should have been let go. This indicates one of two things, the parties making this assertion are either ignorant of the facts in the case, or the sentiment expressed reveals a looseness of morals that no town can afford to boast of. The uncalculated and willful and persistent, indecent exposure that Judson made of his person, after being ordered from the school grounds has never been given to the public in detail, because we thought it unnecessary. The charges were fully proven by three competent witnesses. The citizens of Newberg do claim to be virtuous and parents desire their sons and daughters to grow up in ways of virtue, and when a fellow of Judson's make up deliberately walks on our school grounds and exposes his person in the presence of teachers and scholars as he did, he will be walked off to jail, other people to the contrary notwithstanding, and even though on "palladium" jail which was "bought with a price" would hold him.

We are indebted to Mr. G. W. Wyman for a copy of an English newspaper, "The Herts Guardian," published at Hertford and bearing date of Jan. 4th. We have read it with much interest. In general make up it is somewhat different from that of the American newspaper. The emblem on the title page is the Crown the Bible and the Plow. People over there evidently believe in advertising, even the Pears' Soap man getting in his work.

Below we quote from the paper, thinking it might be of interest to many to know the kind of weather they had over there during holidays.

"The proverbial sickness of the English climate has been shown in a very marked manner this year at Christmas-tide. We have had a most varied alternation from heat to cold—from frost to fresh—so rapid, indeed, that even strong and healthy people have felt the atmospheric change to be anything but a blessing! Christmas day was clear, bright, and beautiful. The previous day was fitted to try the nerves and temper of the strongest and most placid member of the community! In this part of the country there has not, as yet, been a great display of the icicles and snow-white coating of winter; though a day or two ago there was heard on ominous sound of the sharpening of 'Acme's' as if at last King Frost had hearkened to the prayers of his devotees on the ice. In the north the weather has been much more severe; and since the year dawned, we too, have had our share of winter's icy blast. The Christmas tide of 1889 has, however, been in many re-

spects more pleasant than many of its predecessors. The poor we have always with us; but there has been less display than usual of their presence. There is more work to be got, and thanks to the reascendancy of Conservatism, more happiness among the people generally."

The Bird Has Flown.

H. F. Judson, the fellow sent from here to the county jail for safe keeping, some time ago, being bound over for appearance before the Grand Jury on a charge of indecent exposure, broke jail Sunday night and is no doubt looking for greener fields. By the use of a case knife and file which were no doubt furnished him from the outside, he manufactured a saw with which he saved the bars in two on one of the corridor windows and walked forth a free man. This is quite a compliment either on our new jail, or the others in charge, or probably both.

Newberg's Population.

Many, many times the question is asked, "what is the population of Newberg?" And of course this has been a question rather difficult to answer, but we are now able to give a correct answer to the question. Andrew Pickett our efficient school clerk was requested to take the census of the town at the time of taking the enumeration of the school district and we are indebted to him for the information which we are able to give our readers.

His instructions were to make the count of those who lived within the corporate limits and he found just 623. On the south and especially on the west there are a number of families living just over the line who are really as much intown as others, which would increase the population nearly a hundred more. We doubt if any town in western Oregon can show as great a percentage of increase in population as we are able to show the figures for and the indications are that the coming season will bring many more to our town.

Our Taxidermist.

It is quite likely that many of the citizens of Newberg are not aware that we have living in our town a scientific and artistic taxidermist. J. F. Searle who came from Rockford Ill. in the fall, is located near the depot, having bought property there. Mr. Searle is a practical taxidermist and is able to put up a bird or animal, from a humming bird to a rhinoceros, in the highest style of the art. The writer called at his residence Tuesday morning and was shown through his working room. Several birds of different species were laying around the room in different stages of preparation. A large white owl perched on a rest and blinking in one corner of the room while a variety of birds looked down from another corner. A pair of Mongolian pheasants were near by, while coiled at one side lay a small specimen of the traditional "William goal" family. Mr. Searle takes an interest in showing visitors his work and will not doubt be glad to see persons who take an interest in such work. He has put up work for Fred Kewpfer of Chicago, E. B. Bolow and L. Sammut of Portland, Horne and Faine of Eugene City as well as many other firms in the east. He now has an order from Frank B. Webster of Boston Mass. for a number of pheasants, grouse, quail, blue jays and screech owls. He has another order from J. H. Batty of New York for twenty five male and thirty five female quail and five hundred blue jays. The demand for jays must be brisk in the east judging from the order and it will take Mr. Searle quite a while to lay in the stock although the supply is no doubt ample. The untimely taking off of that member will hardly be mourned by the farmers here as the jay is generally considered a noisy nuisance. Mr. Searle is an enthusiast in his profession and the time was pleasantly spent in his room. It is not every town that can boast of a scientific taxidermist and we are glad to welcome Mr. Searle and wife among us.

Building and Loan Association.

On Monday night a number of citizens met in Hobson's photo gallery to talk over the matter of organizing a Building and Loan Association. Dr. Lindley of Portland was present, who explained the general workings of such associations. He has been connected with the work in the east for sixteen years and can explain every detail to the satisfaction of his hearers. Having full faith in Building and Loan Associations he enters into the work with enthusiasm. The difference between local and national associations was fully discussed and the opinion prevailed that for small places an auxiliary to a national was preferable. After considerable discussion the meeting adjourned to meet again Tuesday night. At this meeting the subject was further discussed and a committee appointed to solicit subscription to stock. The committee appointed is composed of Dr. J. B. Moore, Samuel Hobson, G. W. Mitchell and Dr. Lindley. Anyone desiring information in regard to such associations will be enlightened by calling on anyone of the committee. We have not the space to give full details, if we were sufficiently informed to do so, but we are confident that if we can form a

company of sufficient strength, it will be a great benefit to the place. Dr. Lindley represents the "Inter-State Building and Loan Association of Minn." We quote the following from their circular:

THE OBJECT.

Of the Inter-State Building and Loan Association is to assist its members to provide or build homes; to furnish a convenient, safe and profitable method to save money in small sums and to invest the same safely at a good rate of interest on real estate security; to assist its members who may wish to borrow money, or form a capital to enter business. It also enables them to pay back loans in monthly installments, in place of in one sum, and also assist members who have no real estate security by assisting them to a loan on their stock in the Association after a certificate of stock has been in force one year, at reasonable interest and premium.

The Question of the Hour.

In spite of the universal grasping for gold, the world is nearer to being civilized than it ever was before. Our Alaska Letter.

DOUGLAS CITY, ALASKA, Jan. 13th 1890.

The Graphic being gladly received and read in our distant home up here in Alaska, I thought it would be right to send a few lines for its columns for its many readers, especially those who are living in the immediate vicinity of Newberg. Not long since we received one barrel of dry goods, papers, pictures and notions, suitable for our interesting native children, and nine boxes of dried fruit, which was, and is being relished by all of us, and while we are partaking of the delicious food, such that can not be procured here for less than 15 to 25 cents per pound, we are not forgetful of the kind friends that sent them, and especially the Y. W. C. T. Union of that place, who sent us a neat little sum of \$20.25 added to ten dollars they sent us six months ago, is worthy of praise, neither would we be forgetful of the kindness of other friends there, who within the past few months have sent us \$27.00 in cash, besides several other little sums the past two years. Many thanks to you all, kind friends. May God send His richest blessings unto you and may you prosper in all your different avocations of life is our sincere desire. We have not the language to express our gratitude to such kind friends, which has a tendency to make us feel near to you, though many of you are strangers to us.

We are now in the midst of a solid winter, yet we have not experienced it colder than 6 deg. above zero. Snow is nearly two feet deep and sleighing is good, where we have roads cut out, but having no teams here we must comply with our situation and act as both man and beast. We have five bays, three of which are large enough to sail in this line of hauling wood down the mountain side, winding

here and there between trees and stumps, over knolls of earth, and across little hollows; sometimes in our fun coming down with some speed our sled would become unruled and vary a little from its usual route and leaving some of us with our heels pointing upwards with our backs covered with snow, the consequence of which we would find our sled bottom side up and the wood spilled out.

Our nights are short, but are becoming longer, and the sun rising higher every day, so that we noticed just the other morning her beautiful rays entering our windows, which has not occurred before for nearly two long months. We are always glad to see it rising gently above the tall snow capped mountains. It assures us that the long summer days are coming, when we can see to read by its dim light till eleven o'clock at night. One objection we have to this peculiar country and that is, it rains and seldom quits for harvest, which is a drawback to agricultural pursuits. Some seasons, hardy vegetables are raised to almost perfection. I might write more lengthily on many other peculiarities of this mountainous country, but time and printers ink will not admit of it now, but before I close I will say that besides our 5 boys we have 6 bright little native girls, 4 of whom are half breeds. We fail to see but little difference between them and the full bloods as to intellect. It is interesting to listen at them and the boys singing the hymns they have so early learned, and they do it with earnestness and sobriety. C. H. Edwards our teacher claims that one of the boys can exceed him in drawing pictures on the blackboard. We have all the children we have room for and have refused 3 others on account of it. Indications are now, that we will have our training school buildings ready for business before another winter, and in connection with it a fish cannery, which, if rightly managed will make our mission almost self supporting.
