They are alowed to remain for periods varying between three weeks and three months. until a certain decomposition has taken place, so that when removed the pulp is soft and appears as if it had trough made by digging a hole in the ground and paving it with rough stones. oulp is then put into a rough net, opened ground the thicker the oil and the worse the quality. This alone accounts om different places along the coast. Other methods are employed to produce the oil for home consumption, but that here described is the mode usual in the roduction of the palm oil of commerce.
