IN the fall the papers made report of the predictions of the "noble red man," which were that we would have a bad winter, but our copper colored brethren used good judgment in laying by an extra supply of smoked salmon and other "muck-a-muck."

THE past winter, if we may even hint that it is past, has been a rough one for western Oregon and will long be remembered for the cold rains and slushy, snowy weather, and the extremely high water. The first of this week we had a variety of weather of the kind, that a few years ago induced many of us to leave the Mississippi states. The northwest has certainly tried herself this winter and we hope this will answer for several winters to come.

THE law abiding people of our neighborhood town, Dundee, have cause for alarm and complaint. Lee Smith is said to be dispensing fire water from behind darkened windows with a sign over the door of "City Saloon." Knowing Lee as well as we do, we have no doubt, but that in his sober moments he is heartily ashamed of his business, but he has periodic spells in which he is afflicted much like the woman in history, whose name was Mary Magdalene. The casting of even one devil out of Dundee would have a wholesome effect, while in our town it would take two to improve matters much.

THE reputation of this valley as a healthful locality is certainly endangered. One of our druggists lately received from Portland a case of flasks and corks, and he only sells whiskey for medicinal purposes, so say his real nasal customers. This, as well as the number of whiskey barrels sitting about the shop would indicate that sickness was on the increase in Cheltenham. Our real estate men had better resolve themselves into a committee of the whole and investigate as to the cause of so much doctoring. Such an amount of medicine was not formerly needed here. Can it be owing to a change in the climate?

BEFORE the big snow fell in the mountains, four men started in the direction of the Siletia Indian Reservation, on a hunting and trapping expedition. After selecting a suitable place for their camp on the western side of the divide, two of the party returned to the valley with the horses and were then intending to go back to the camp, but the big snow fell and they could not return. The two that were left in the mountains undertook to go over the mountains to the valley after their provisions had almost failed, but the snow was too deep and they returned to camp the same night. Then they started down the river, hoping to get out to the reservation. They only had a loaf of bread, a pound of meat and a few matches. For forty-five days they wandered over rugged mountains and through deep canyons, living on fern roots and sorrel leaves. It seemed that all game had left before the snow as if by instinct. They managed to get one salmon that helped them for a while. Finally after all was gone except two matches, they sat by a poor fire one evening, having given up to die, when they were found by some Indian hunters from the reservation, who took them to a house and gave them proper care and attention.

A Colony.
We understand that the old man Sellwood of Multnomah county, has bought a body of land containing 930 acres in this county, laying opposite Champco, and running from the willamette river back north up the side of Parrott mountain. Mr. Sellwood's idea, if we are correctly informed, is to lay the land off in small tracts and allow families to occupy the land under certain conditions. A nominal rent is to be paid and the party is allowed to remain on the land as long as he complies with the conditions. An Episcopal church is to be built by Mr. Sellwood and one of the conditions are that the members of the colony shall attend and strictly adhere to the church. Another is that no intoxicants shall be allowed on the land. There are probably other conditions of which we have not been informed. If this plan is carried out it will tend to improve and develop the strip of land down in the "pocket" below Newberg.

A Rare Specimen.
Mr. G. W. Wyman has a very rare specimen of the feathered tribe, which he brought from New Zealand. Mr. Wyman says that in New Zealand it is called a Kiwi, the i taking the sound of a Johnson's Cyclopeda says of this bird that "it belongs to the Apteryx family of radiate birds with rudimentary wings, very short legs, only one nasal opening

lance, with a long bill and those plumage. Three species inhabit New Zealand where they are called Kiwi. They feed upon insects of various kinds, more especially on worms, which it is said they attract to the surface by jumping and striking on the ground with their powerful feet. The skin is very tough, but flexible and is prized by the chiefs for the manufacture of their state mantles. Three species have been found, but they are believed to be nearly extinct." The bird that Mr. Wyman has is only about the size of a small chicken and has no sign of wings or tail. He says they are easily caught by a dog and as there is great demand for them by foreigners, he thinks they will soon be gone.

Newberg and Its Needs.

Being a new comer in this community, it may seem presumptuous in me to dictate to others better acquainted with the needs of this city, and surrounding country; so with your permission, I will make a few suggestions which I think are needed. Newberg is most delightfully situated. During the last terrible snow and rain storms, which caused so much damage to almost every city on the coast, this place was no more affected by them than it would have been by an afternoon's rain, high above the adjacent streams, well watered in every direction, it has nothing to fear from flood or draught. Nature could not have been more lavish in her bounty than she has been to this valley, with her rolling hills and the richest soil, every foot of which is capable of producing the richest fruits, why is it that more land is not under cultivation? or the city and valley is so little known? The future of Newberg looks bright and with proper management there is no reason why it may not prove so. In a few months our miserable railroad system will be remodeled and as far as time is concerned we will then be close to Portland's doors, which will give us a ready market for all our products and will also be the means of bringing many visitors to this favored and charming spot; but are we prepared to receive company? I think not. We boast of a municipal government, but what is it doing, not one decent street in the whole city, nothing but mud roads. There is no question about it being good mud and plenty of it, but a good coat of gravel on top would improve them. Then again a stranger visiting a city, likes to take a ride into the suburbs and see the adjacent country, perhaps with a view of investing his money in land, making a home. Now where is the road leading out of the city that is passable. Take for instance the one going west, barely outside of the city limits, a light wagon would go but deep in the mud, down hill onto a little bridge barely long enough to span the water of a small creek in dry weather, after crossing which, the principal ingredients of the road are mud poles and stumps. Some may say that the city has nothing to do with the roads outside of its limits. I beg to differ with such. The city in a great measure derives its business from outside sources and anything that advances the interests of the country benefits the city, each is dependent on the other, and both should work together.

Newberg ought to have a population of five thousand two years hence and I with a little enterprise it could be done. Almost every other city in the northwest is growing rapidly, why should not this? Sleep is very refreshing, but too much of it will make a sluggish and Newberg has slept too long and it is time to awake and go to work in earnest. A large immigration is expected to this valley this spring and we should be prepared to receive them and be able to show them the great advantages which we possess over other parts of the country, but with such roads as we now have, we may as well let them pass by for a ride into the country would disgust them so much that any intention they may have entertained would vanish as quickly as the morning mist before the bright sun. Nature has certainly done her part well, and this valley would be dotted all over with prosperous and contented homes, Newberg would obtain the proud appellation she is so justly entitled to of being the Garden City of the Northwest. Property would be eagerly sought after at enhanced prices. Manufacturing would spring up, giving employment to young and old, and with the fine educational advantages to be obtained here, it would be considered a proud distinction for a person to be able to say, I am a citizen of Newberg. There are many other matters which ought to be mentioned, but this is already too long, hoping it may be the means of awakening a little interest in home affairs, I will close.

We publish the above for two reasons. First it is very well written and contains some very good suggestions, and secondly almost all new comers must have their say after which they usually feel very much relieved. We believe the writer to be a fair minded gentleman and are confident that he had waited a while until he could have fully taken in the situation here he would not have made some of the criticisms that he embodies in his letter. In his reference to roads leading out of Newberg he refers to the one leading west from town which is a new road laid out through green timber for the purpose of opening up a large body of land that has been laying idle probably ever since the flood. For the past nine years, to our certain knowledge there has been in this Road district a new road to open to satisfy some part of the district almost every year.

"It" should remember that new countries are not as a rule settled by millionaires but rather by people who are of limited means and while they are willing to put a liberal amount of work on public roads there are other wants that must be met. There are large tracts of land being divided up to suit the demands of the small buyer and this necessitates the opening of many new roads. While this is the case the work must be spread out

over the district to satisfy all and for a while we need not expect every by-way to be made a turnpike.

"It" says "almost every other city in the northwest is growing rapidly, why should not this?" One of the managers of the "Oregon Land Co." of Salem said here publicly a short time ago that Newberg had in the past year made the most rapid growth according to size of any town in Oregon.

"It" also says that "Newberg has already slept too long," and then after running off into another flight of eloquence in referring to the possibilities of our future in which he puts a twenty per cent discount on any effort a real estate man might make, he winds up by referring to the fine educational advantages of our town. We beg to inform the writer that the foundation for the fine educational advantages he refers to and which we all are proud of, has been laid at the expense of purses that were not over burdened with ready cash and if the pile had been divided very promiscuously, the school houses we now see would only be visible to a brilliant imagination.

Give our people a little time to make the money, and add the proper encouragement and Newberg is all right. However we are glad the new comers sees some of our needs for he may thus be induced to lay his own shoulder to the wheel and help roll the chariot along.

W. C. T. U. COLUMN.

"For God and Home and Native Land."

Miss Fannie Griffin, one of the seven national organizers of the W. C. T. U. is meeting with notable success in Alabama, having established several new unions since the national convention.

Mrs. S. F. Grubb, national W. C. T. U. superintendent of work among foreigners, has written a "Catechism on Government" to be published in Swedish for free distribution among people of that nationality.

A distinguished Englishman, returning to his own country after a careful study of our American institutions, on being asked what he had seen that was most unlike England, answered: "The wireless dinner tables of the great middle class."

The school board of Asheville, N. C., has granted the W. C. T. U. the privilege of teaching scientific temperance half an hour each day in the primary grades of the city schools. The union has employed an excellent kindergarten teacher who will work under its supervision.

A striking illustration of the common injustice to women wage workers was incidentally discovered from a study of the United States census reports for 1893. At that time in a certain county in Massachusetts were two neighboring factories, one employing men, the other women. The factory employing men paid an average salary of \$513 a head while the one employing women paid only \$143 a head—this disparity notwithstanding the fact, also shown by figures, that the woman's labor was no less profitable than that of the man.

Mrs. Caroline B. Buell, corresponding secretary of the national W. C. T. U., in her annual report for 1899, draws a striking comparison between the size and power of the organization at the end of the year just closed. In 1875 the total membership was not more than 7,600. It is now at least 142,000. The total receipts at the end of the first year were \$381; last year for dues alone \$14,234. The society now has branches in every state and territory of the union, including Alaska and the District of Columbia. It has also established prosperous unions in several foreign countries, notably, China, India and Australia. Although since the national convention in November, certain members have withdrawn owing to the action of the Iowa delegates, many new unions have also been organized as well as new members added to existing unions while an increase of interest is reported from many quarters.

Miss Francis E. Willard, president of the World's and National W. C. T. U., recently sent a letter to the South American, Central American and Mexican Commissioners of the Pan American Congress, bustling with points concerning distinctive features of our American civilization not hitherto presented for their consideration. In extending greetings from the National W. C. T. U. Miss Willard says: "We are glad that the peaceful panorama of this Republic's material civilization has been unveiled before you, and sorry that its higher and more enduring forces could not be equally displayed. We read with regret of the almost continuous banquetting in which intoxicating liquors held a place so prominent, for such customs are but a relief of European, not a feature of our western civilization."

A nation that has made the sale of liquor a crime against constitutional law in seven of its forty-two states, and by local enactment over well-nigh one-half of its populated area, fails to illustrate its distinctive national features, when it places intoxicating liquors before its guests.

Will you permit us respectfully to urge upon your attention the study of our prohibitory states, for we believe that no other line of investigation open to you in the great republic, promises so much of blessing to your own respective countries; and because the chief corner stone of the state is the heart stone, we also urge you to visit our colleges for women, for it is, as you know, the United States' idea that the home can only come when the wife and mother is an equal partner in all that pertains to its sacred interests.
