W. C. T. U. COLUMN. "For God and Home and Native Land."

The Y. W. C. T. U. of Plainfield, N. J., has a temperance drill class of about fifty colored children, which meets once a week throughout the year.

The Young Woman's Christian Temperance Union of Honolulu, a society of very young girls, not only gives aid to two native organizations, but has also this year raised one hundred dollars of the salary paid the W. C. T. U. missionary, a lady who is constantly employed in gospel-temperance work among all classes of Hawaiians.

This testimony came from a reformed man in Arkansas. It was given in his last hour: "The white ribbon made a man of me and led me to Christ. When you place me in my coffin pin it on my coat."

Elizabeth Constock, the Quaker preacher, now aged and infirm, living at Union Springs, N. Y., has in her lifetime visited 12,000 prisoners, 105,000 sick and wounded soldiers, 85,000 inmates of poorhouses and almshouses, on both sides of the water.

President James H. Canfield of the National Educational association, is a man abreast of the times. He has given one of the four evenings at the great St. Paul convention to women speakers—five distinguished teachers, Misses Laughlin, Pennell, Locke, Sullivan and Hicks speaking on "The Moral Value of Art Education" and Miss Frances E. Willard on "The White Cross Movement in Education."

Mary T. Burr, president of the state W. C. T. U. of New York, has published a stirring letter in support of the prohibitory amendment now pending in that state. She says in conclusion: "The burden of responsibility for the success of the amendment is upon every temperance man and woman in the state. The Woman's Christian Temperance Union, loyal to the cause of prohibition, accepts the responsibility, and with its 1,000 local unions and 21,000 members will lend every energy for the adoption of the amendment."

The published testimony of leading states' attorneys and mayors throughout South Dakota, shows that prohibition is already a pronounced success in that state, that the open saloon has been completely wiped out, arrests for drunkenness and other crimes reduced to a minimum, and that the "blind pig" and the "hole in the wall" are following the fate of the open saloon.

The whole amount of tax on spirits and liquors collected in the country is over \$63,000,000 per annum, an average to each person of \$1.50. In New Jersey the average is three cents. So says the New York Independent when upon an exchange philosophizes: "Happy New Jersey! collecting a tax on liquors to the amount of two dollars for each inhabitant; and poor Maine! collecting only three cents for each person. It must be a wonder to those revenue picklers how the state of Maine succeeds in running its government with so small a whisky revenue. Let them visit that state, as we have done, and take observations. If they stay long enough to get cured of liquor on the brain, so that they can see and reason clearly, they will find a happy state of things where liquor is not made to enrich the many in order to fill the pockets of the few."

The W. C. T. U. met last Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. After devotional exercises conducted by the president, the roll was called and minutes of previous meeting read and approved. The committee appointed at last meeting to arrange for an entertainment and festival on the evening of the 4th of July, reported that they cleared a little more than fifteen dollars.
