The G. A. R. tent was filled with an eager audience last Friday night, gathered to listen to the account of prison life in the late rebellion by Ralph O. Bates. The audience sat on hard benches for two hours and a half, almost without a stir, listening to the tragic account given by Mr. Bates, of his hard fate while in nearly all the southern prison pens, and of his escape from Andersonville by way of an underground tunnel which he and his friend Dick were over seven months in digging. He told of the days and nights of pain and suffering while hiding in swamps and wading streams to evade capture by blood hounds, of their pitiful plight to tell the tale of war to President Lincoln, and their final return to home and friends. A more interesting lecture has not been delivered in Newberg in many a day.

Fair Notes.

To say the fair was a success is putting it mild.

Allen S. Craven of Middleton made a fine display of fruit, vegetables, grain, grasses, &c.

Hon. J. C. Nelson says he took his share of premiums on farm products and will with this seasons work retire from active work on the farm.

Miss Lillie Maloney came down from Sheridan to attend the fair.

Yamhill's best crop, the babies showed up in fine style. The ladies who showed the dimpled darlings under six months old were Mrs. H. Heston, Mrs. Maggie George, Mrs. Carrie Blair, Mrs. Jennie Mills. Mrs. Blair took first and Mrs. George second prize.

Those showing in the older class were Mrs. Vannie Moore, Mrs. Chas. Kendall, Mrs. Geo. Grayson and Mrs. Chas. Baker. Mrs. Moore took first prize and Mrs. Baker second.

The pumpkin pie contest was simply immense. The contestants George Lightner, J. L. Bristow and Frank Jones took their places on the band stand and had their hands tied behind them. A nice warm healthy looking pumpkin pie was placed on a table in front of each one and at a given signal the nibbling and swallowing began. The faster the pie disappeared the louder the crowd yelled, and as Frank Jones swallowed the last crumb of his pie and pocketed the prize of \$2.50 the applause was deafening. While the other boys failed to take the prize they got a free dinner of warm pie and went away with smiles of contentment. For pure unadulterated fun this was the best thing on the whole program.

Jas. Lowell exhibited nine very nice large water-melons.

Will Thomas brought the largest cabbage head ever shown at our fair. It was big enough for a dozen dinners.

The number of old soldiers who attended the G. A. R. reunion was not as large as was expected but those who did attend talked over old times, beat the drum, waved the stars and stripes, feasted on pork and beans and had a general good time together.

Mr. Lewis exhibited a nice collection of woods including many from the Mississippi valley, also a number of other relics and curiosities.

Mr. Buchanan showed fine samples of his rockers, settees &c. made of huzel.

The music rendered by the band boys was highly appreciated. The boys are getting there in fine shape.

There are many things we desire to say this week in regard to the fair and the Grand Army reunion, that we have no room for on account of publishing the long list of premiums.

The art department made a very creditable showing and was all the more interesting on account of nearly all the collection being made up of pieces executed by home talent. Several pieces of painting on cloth by different ladies were very nice. S. Hobson showed specimens of his work in India ink and photo work. The academy students made a fine exhibit. A case of birds in this department put up by J. F. Searls attracted considerable attention.

The crowd was the largest Newberg has ever had and everybody seemed to be out for a good time.

Mr. Harger of West Chehalis showed seven sacks of very fine beans, one of barley and one of white winter wheat. The wheat was a sample of 2104 bushels of the harvest of 1893, raised on 70 acres of land that has been in cultivation ever since 1844. Mr. Harger is one of the best farmers in the valley as his samples gave testimony.

E. W. Weesner made a display of curiosities collected while in Alaska including dried and canned fruit, jellies &c. from native fruit and berries. Also articles carved from wood and marble by the Indians among which was a card receiver carved from a block of black marble which was found on Queen Charlottes island.

The 500 plates of fruit made a fine showing.

He was carried off the field and it was thought during the evening that his chances for recovery were doubtful, but he is improving and will be out again in a few days.
