W. C. T. U. work is in the direct line of promotion, as is proved by the fact that so many who have received training in our ranks are called to other work. Now it is the National Superintendent of Press Work, Mary H. Henry, and the call comes from the Chautauquan to join its editorial staff. This removes her to Meadville, Pa. where the heartiest good wishes of all her co-laborers follow her. We congratulate the Chautauquan on securing so facile a pen for its service, and rejoice that by her going the bonds already uniting these two great movements are strengthened.

W. C. T. U. women are instant in season and out, even when at fashionable summer resorts not neglecting to work for the cause. This was lately illustrated at Yellow Springs, Virginia, where Mrs. Merrick, Louisiana's accomplished president, was seeking needed rest. At the request of the local president, she held a parlor meeting in the hotel; the place, the time and the leader made it a meeting to be remembered. She introduced her hearers to the leaders of the W. C. T. U. in such an engaging manner as to make each one feel a personal interest in them and a desire to hear them speak. She then showed how this movement is founded on scientific knowledge, anchored by religious faith and pervaded by sisterly love; she ventured to speak freely of woman's ballot, reassuring them by the thought that while we are under the law of the universal law of progress God will not suffer anything to come to us which he disapproves or which he cannot overrule for his own glory and our good. The

truth shall make us free, and if ancient prejudice must disappear before this truth we need not be panic-stricken at that. The ladies listened most attentively and doubtless many carried away truer ideas concerning the work than they had before.

An education which demands special enjoyment or pleasure through the sense of taste is wholly artificial. It is coming down to the animal plane, or below it, rather, for the instinct of the brute creation teaches it merely to eat to live.

Yet think how widespread this habit of sensuous gratification through the sense of taste is. If we call upon a neighbor, the first thing is to offer refreshments of some kind, as though the greatest blessing of life came from indulging the appetite. This evil is largely due to wrong education which begins with childhood. When Johnnie sits down to the table, the mother says, "Johnnie, what would you like?", instead of putting plain, wholesome food before the child, and taking it as a matter of course that he will eat it and be satisfied. The child grows to think that he must have what he likes whether it is good for him or not. It is not strange that an appetite thus pampered in childhood becomes uncontrollable at maturity, for the step from gormandizing to intoxicants is much shorter than most people imagine. The natural, unperverted taste of a child will lead him to eat that which is good for him. But how can we expect the children to reform when the parents continually set them such bad examples in the matter of eating and drinking?

The cultivation of a taste for spices is a degradation of the sense of taste. Nature never designed that pleasure should be divorced from use. The effects of gratifying the sense of taste differ materially from those of gratifying the higher senses of sight and hearing. What we see is gone; nothing remains but the memory; and the same is true of the sweetest sounds which may reach us through the ears. But what we taste is swallowed into the stomach, and what has thus given us a brief pleasure through the gratification of the palate, must make work in the alimentary canal for fourteen hours before it is disposed of.

We may smile with contempt upon the practice of the Romans in their degenerate days of providing a "vomitorium" adjoining the dining room, where guests who had supped until their stomachs could retain no more, could retire and empty them by emetic; but, after all, it was better than the practice of continually eating for the sake of gratifying the taste and keeping the stomach constantly at work upon all sorts of indigestible things. Feasters of the present day are on a level with those who gathered around Nero's table.
