Farmers who have wheat stored don't wear countenances that are particularly bright just now as wheat is only sixty cents. It doesn't appear to a man in the moon that there is any good reason why wheat should be so low here, when this is worth considerable more in the east. The most probable reason is that Portland buyers have laid their heads together to keep prices down in order to make up for the severe losses they sustained two years ago.

The meeting of our state legislature is not very far away now, being the first week in January. Hon. Thomas H. Tongue of Washington county is spoken of as a probable candidate for president of the senate and the contestants for speaker of the house will be Hon. H. B. Miller of Josephine and Hon. T. T. Gier of Marion. Tongue would make an excellent presiding officer for the senate and either of the other gentlemen named would fill the speaker's chair with credit to the county that elected them.

One people who are interested in mission work among the Indians on Klamath agency will be glad to know that Lish Applegate has been removed and a man with a better reputation appointed in his place as agent. The *Capital Journal* says:

D. W. Matthew, of this city, who was recently appointed Indian agent at the Klamath reservation has furnished bonds in the sum of \$10,000 with Capt. Ormsby, C. B. Moores, Edward Hirsch, M. E. Goddell and Hon. A. Bush as security. The bonds have been approved by Judge Deady and District U. S. Attorney Mays and has been sent to the headquarters at Washington. Mr. Matthew will probably assume the duties of the position about the first of January. He will go and his family will follow later.

We acknowledge the receipt of a \$1 silver certificate in payment for an advertisement, which looks as if it had been used as a flag in both the Mexican and civil wars and afterwards used as a wash rag for several years; but by a powerful inspection the name of C. We haven't much complaint to make down here with our business men. The most of them see that it is to their advantage to let people know when they have something to sell and patronize the home paper by using printer's ink. There are a few however who evidently think best to hide their light under a bushel, but we still have some hope that even those will get their blind eyes open.

There are several questions that will effect the future prosperity of our town that may very properly be considered by the Horticultural society; one of which is the question of a fruit cannery. The society ought to discuss this question at an early day and see how soon it is solved.

He to undertake to get a cannery established here. That we must have a cannery in the near future is generally conceded, but we don't want to try to induce capitalists to invest in one until there is sufficient fruit to justify it. This phase of the question ought to be fully considered and plans should be laid at once to correspond with experienced parties and learn the demands of a cannery. A gentleman from California was here a few weeks ago named Edwards who came across from Hillsboro to visit the Newberg Nursery. He told Mr. Cooper that he was engaged in the canning business in California and that there were a number of other canneries running in the same vicinity and they were all making money. He was confident that it would be no trouble to get such an establishment here if we would advertise. It occurs to us that as soon as the organization of our society is complete it would be a wise thing to appoint a committee to thoroughly investigate the thing, find what we have that can be depended on and ascertain from experienced parties what more we need, if anything. We believe that this is a question of the utmost importance to Newberg and the surrounding country, and to act wisely we need to map out the right course for the future, seems to us the proper thing.

Below will be found a little wholesome advice that will be of use to some of our people to read and ponder over.
"Build up your home, it is your duty; you cannot improve it by taking money away to spend or invest. There is no way of improving a place so much as by encouraging good merchants, good schools and good people to settle among you, and this cannot be done unless you spend your money at home."

Set the example now.

Spend your money at home; set the example now; buy your dry goods, groceries, meat and everything at home, and you will see a wonderful change in a short time in the business outlook of the place; therefore deal with your home merchants.

Spend your money at home. What do you gain by going off? Count the time and cost. See what you have done at home by letting your merchant have the cash. His gain is your profit. He is the man that helps to build your school houses, churches, roads and streets. Helps to provide for the widows and orphans in need.

Spend your money at home; your merchants are your neighbors, your friends, and they stand by you in sickness; they are your associates. Without your trade they cannot keep your business. No stores, then no bank, no one wanting to buy property to settle on, or build up your town.—Ex.

BIG RED APPLES.
The Horticultural Society Born Monday Night, and Proves to Be a Healthy Youth.

In answer to the call made in last week's Graphic for a public meeting to consider the propriety of organizing a Horticultural Society at Newberg, a number of persons, some of whom are already practical fruit men, and others who are anxious to learn all they can, met at the public school house last Monday night. On motion Elmer Armstrong was elected temporary chairman and J. H. Ross temporary secretary. Remarks were made by Dr. A. Mills, Charles Mitchell, James Lovell and others, in regard to the propriety of a permanent organization. In the remarks made the following points were brought out—there are many things to consider in setting an orchard, the proper varieties to set for profit—proper distances to observe in setting trees—soil and drainage to be considered—well directed efforts to be made in the war against fruit pests—a variety of information that is sought after by those coming from general farming and stock raising to engage in the fruit business. Considering all these facts, and the cooperation, and the comparing of notes would prove beneficial, and tend to stimulate the already growing interest in fruit culture in our midst, a general demand was made for effecting an immediate organization. A call was made for the names of those who were ready to join the society and the following names were enrolled as charter members, Elmer Armstrong, J. H. Ross, A. Ross, Chas. Mitchell, Jas. Lovell, Dr. Mills, Dr. Moore, J. I. Halley, Henry Morris, W. S. Mills, W. S. Ross, Paul May, A. B. Cooper and E. H. Woodward. On motion of Chas. Mitchell the following committee was appointed to draft a constitution and bylaws, and present to next meeting the names of suitable persons to serve as officers of the society, viz: Dr. A. Mills, Chas. Mitchell and J. H. Ross. Next Saturday night was fixed as the time for the meeting to effect a permanent organization, and Dr. Mills and J. H. Ross were appointed to read papers at that meeting on the subject, "Proper distances to observe in setting trees," to be followed by general discussion. All are cordially invited to attend the next meeting, and especially those who are willing to join in and make the society a success.

FARMERS' INSTITUTE.
The committee to whom was intrusted the task of formulating a program for the farmers' institute, to be held December 30th and 31st, will meet in this city on the 27th inst. Institutes are being held in some of the counties south of us, and appear to be stirring up considerable interest among farmers.—Reporter.
