Home Industries.

Newberg is not as well supplied with home industries and manufactures as would be best for her material interests, nor do her stores carry as full stock in some of the different lines as would please our fancy and we often hear complaints that we can't get what we want, or can't get a hat without getting one like everybody else wears, and from others that there is not enough going on—not enough manufactures to give employment for the laboring classes and to induce them to locate in our town. Did you ever stop to think whether you are partly to blame for this, and whether we as citizens have nothing to do in bringing about a better state of affairs? The writer has for some time made it a rule not to buy a penny's worth of anything away from home that could be gotten through our home-dealers and if any articles are on the market that are produced at home give them the preference always. It seems to us that if every one would adopt this rule it would be but a short time till our merchants would be able to carry stocks fully adequate to the demands of the trade. It is poor encouragement to our merchants for some of the most prominent citizens and those most interested and profited by the growth and development of the town, to bring in their butter and eggs and what little other produce they may have to spare, buy a few groceries and other small necessary articles—upon which profits are small—and when they have a few hundred to spend for the year supply of clothing &c. go to the city for it.

We often hear persons remark that Newberg needs a good merchant mill and it would in fact, be a splendid thing to have all the grain raised in the valley ground up right here and keep the feed at home and ship the flour. In this way feed would be more plentiful and cheap, considerable would be saved on freight and by having granaries and warehouses a great deal could be saved the farmers in the way of sacks.

Although the mill we now have is not of sufficient capacity to grind all the wheat raised here, it is second to none of its capacity and we fear that some of our citizens do not appreciate or patronize it as much as they should. It is a remarkable fact that many persons have the idea their flour must come from some distant mill to be good. I believe there is more of other brands of flour sold by the dealers in town than of the Newberg flour, which should not be, and a thorough test is all that is needed to change this around. I do not know who is to blame most, the citizens or the dealers. If dealers would keep nothing else for a short time there would cease to be any demand for anything else. Tarrant & Son are among our most enterprising citizens and have spared no pains nor money to make their mill first class and they are turning out flour second to none in quality and if your wife can't make good bread of it we would hate to insult you by telling you she is not a good baker but it is a fact nevertheless.

If we would have Newberg grow and prosper as she should, let our citizens stand by each other and encourage all our institutions by patronizing them; all pull together, and in the same direction, and we will get there.
