J. B. CAMPBELL of Chicago in speaking of the Columbian exposition says: "It is now proposed to establish a mammoth Zoological Palace. It is to be the greatest animal collection beneath the sun. Into the palace they will bring a specimen of every creature (except man) that walks, runs, crawls, swims, or flies between Point Barrow and Cape Horn. Also, all the creatures that roam through the Amazon basin, over the heights of the Andes, across the great plains of Asia, into the deserts of Africa, and over the island world of the Pacific."

Great indeed would be such a collection and only mentioned in season, as many of the now living specimens, as well as this generation of men, will have disappeared before the return of another Columbian Exposition. As a feature such an array of the animal kingdom would be the delight of the children; a source of education and enlightenment to all, and a scene of admiration and wonder to the congregations of the world.

A Planetarium System Exhibit will probably be established. It will be arranged high above the exposition, operated by electricity, showing the solar system so as to get the relative sizes, distances and motions of the sun and planets. The stars and planets would be lighted up with electricity and perhaps arranged with seats so that the inhabitants of the earth might take a trip on them as they traveled through space in different directions on their annual tour. By this novel and instructive feature not only the nations of the earth but the planets of the solar system will be gathered in attendance at the World's Columbian Exposition.

It is claimed that the rainfall in November was the highest ever known in the history of Oregon. The weather all fall has been remarkably fine for building and all kinds of work except plowing. Some complaint is being made of wells going dry.

Truillings Coal Mine.

We mentioned last week that Mr. Truillinger had been prospecting for coal on his farm two and a half miles west of town and that a good specimen of coal had been found. Work has been continued ever since without cessation with prospect getting better all the time. Mr. Edwards was in yesterday with specimens of the last coal taken out which is much better than the first. They have bored a little higher up on the point to a depth of 24 feet and have struck a vein 3 feet in thickness. They bored through petrified wood and bones of animals of the past ages. Mr. Edwards is an old coal miner and says there is no mistake but that this is a rich find. Mr. Truillinger is confident and will put on a force of twenty men next week and begin tunneling into the hills to fully develop the mine. If the vein increases in thickness and the present anticipations are realized a boom for Newberg will be hard to prevent.

Why not organize a board of trade in Dayton? All towns of any note in the state are organizing and taking steps to call attention to their respective localities, and working to secure a portion of the large number of people pouring to the Northwest and into Oregon. Here, in the vicinity of Dayton, are towns not possessing half the natural advantages of this place, nor the prestige of being one of the oldest towns that are taking front rank in the march of progress. Our townsmen will pardon us for referring to an aspiring neighboring town. We refer to Newberg, which we have heard designated as a "hole in the ground." A few years ago the town site was a brush patch, but through the energy and push of the town proprietors the place was thoroughly advertised and the result has been a live town with good schools, churches, a bank and various other branches of business no saloon—with a prosperous and contented people. What can be done in the woods with no natural resources for building a town can be more easily accomplished where Providence has munificently smiled and bestowed in abundance every natural advantage to aid in the building of a live flourishing town.—Dayton Herald.

That is right brother Conover; get after the mossback element of your town with a sharp stick. That element has held the reins in Dayton all these years, and like the old timers of La Fayette who were satisfied with the possession of the court house, they have been satisfied with the reputation of being "at the head of navigation" on the "laughing waters" of the mighty Yamhill. Natural advantages are no good to a town if the residents thereof allow themselves to be lulled into a dreamy, Rip Van Winkle sleep of lazy satisfaction, and undertake to survive on that reputation. La Fayette people now admit that looting the court house has been a blessing to the town and we predict that if the Yamhill river was improved so that "the head of navigation" song would be lost to Dayton, her people would then see the necessity for something to take the place of lost prestige and new life would be infused into the town. When the Herald man intimates that Dayton is rich in natural advantages and that Newberg has none he is slightly off. While Dayton is on the Yamhill, the water has been so low at the mouth of the river that no boat has been able to enter the river for four months and this at a time in the year when farmers are anxious to move their grain. Here we have the advantage of both the river and the railroad and being nearer Portland we get lower freight rates than towns farther up the valley. Our river is the great Willamette whose waters carry boats back and forth past our town the year round without regard to the early and the latter rains. That fruit raising is to be the great industry of this country in the near future is generally conceded and as a locality specially favored by nature for successful fruit raising we challenge any other locality in the country. And our assertions are not based entirely on theory for our orchards already attest the truthfulness of the assertion. The mountains on the north and east shut off the cold northeast winds and the hills on the west the strong sea breeze. While our timbered land has been encroached at, men of experience will say that this is better for fruit than prairie land. We could mention other advantages we are in possession of but this is enough for the present. Newberg is getting to the front in good shape and Dayton will follow along in much better order if her citizens will profit by the wholesome advice given by the Herald.

Yesterday the first story of the Woodburn water works was raised. It is 4 feet high, framed out of 12 x 12. The next story will be 28 feet high, framed out of 10 x 10. Mr. Remington states that he will place a hundred foot pole on top of the water works and swing two 2900 candle power arc lights 187 feet above the level of the street. They can be seen for twenty miles on a dark night.—Woodburn Independent.

At their home below Canby, on the Willamette river, Wednesday evening, the young daughter of Mr. Armstrong accidentally shot her little 6-year-old sister through the head. The young lady had taken a rifle down to shoot a duck, and, coming in the house, proceeded to unload the weapon by removing the cartridge.
