We Will Have a Cannery.
The fact that Newberg is to have a cannery will be welcome news to our people.

Mr. Stabler, who lately came from Maryland and Jesse Edwards of our town have associated themselves together, and will commence the business in a moderate way this season. This season at least they will can fruit only and later on will enlarge the business as more fruit comes into bearing. Mr. Stabler comes with a life long experience in the canning business, his father having been one of the first to commence the fruit canning business in the United States. He is familiar with all the details of the business and the enterprise will not fail for lack of a competent manager. While some may think that we ought to have a cannery to start on a larger scale, we are glad to see this coming as it is. If it proves to be a profitable investment as it no doubt will, it can very easily be enlarged to meet all the demands of the place.

Horticultural Meeting.
A very lively meeting of the horticultural society was held at the public school building last Saturday, although the number in attendance was not as large as a community making the pretensions to fruit raising that this does ought to furnish. There are men here who talk the fruit business with glib tongues privately, who make themselves very conspicuous by their absence from these meetings.

Scott Inglis read a very interesting and instructive article on the early pruning of fruit trees, relating more especially to the proper mode of pruning when first taken from the nursery in order to give the tree the proper head. The reading of the paper was followed by discussion of the subject by J. H. Rees and others.

The majority of the speakers inclined to the idea that the top should be cut back so that the limbs would start out from eighteen to twenty-four inches from the ground. N. G. Kirk led the discussion of the subject "Cultivation of Young Orchards," giving some valuable hints on the subject. Thorough under draining of land was urged to get the best results.

The young orchard should be well cultivated, keeping all weeds down and the ground kept as level as possible, avoiding all ridges.

At Rest.
DIED—On Saturday night, March 21, 1891, at his home in Newberg, Cyrus Lamb, aged 49 years.

Mr. Lamb came here a few years ago in rather poor health at the time. They bought a home and Mr. Lamb has always been a very industrious, hard working man, although much of the time at work when he was unable to perform labor and do himself justice. He was a modest, unassuming man, a kind husband and a loving father. He was taken with la grippe which took a strong hold on his weak system from the start, and he was unable to rally from the attack. Mr. Lamb was converted when twenty-seven years of age, and stated a short time before his death that he was not afraid to die. He leaves a wife and three daughters to mourn his loss. The funeral services which were conducted by Jane Votaw, were held at Friends' church, Monday at 10 o'clock.

Virgil Vantress, was born November 26th 1836 and died March 21st 1891 aged 54 years, 2 months, 25 days.

He was of a kind and loving disposition, and an example of patience. During his sickness which was of three weeks duration, he bore it patiently to the end, and now though we sadly miss our loved one, we have the blessed assurance that he is at rest.

The funeral services were conducted by Mrs. Edwards, from Friends' church, Sunday afternoon.

Report of Annual Meeting.
The annual meeting of Newberg union was held last Saturday at 8 o'clock p. m. The meeting was opened with short devotional exercises. The Secretary reported 50 active, and 33 honorary members, making a total membership of 83, with an average attendance of 15 5-12.

The treasurer reported amount of money raised by dues in the past year \$27.75, amount raised by entertainments \$44.62. Superintendents of departments, numbering twenty, with a few exceptions gave full reports. The superintendent of literature reported 9238 pages distributed.

The press superintendent read an encouraging letter from Mrs. L. A. Nash, of Corvallis, State Superintendent of press work, which was ordered published in our column. On motion a committee was appointed to select a gift as a token of our appreciation of the services of the retiring president, Mrs. Woodward, who served the union as president for four years. There was a good attendance, and much interest was manifested.

Superintendents are requested to select their assistants and report the same to the secretary at their earliest possible convenience, so that she may embody the same in her report. Delegates were appointed to attend the County convention to be held at Amity some time in April.

Letter from State Press Superintendent.
DEAR SISTERS: I feel inclined always to look upon your community as an apt type of cultivated womanhood. You may think me rather rash in making this assertion as I have never visited you, but one can judge of a community by the individuals representing the whole at conventions, and the Newberg delegation seems to carry the palm (when compared with the delegations from other places) both in numbers and in efficiency. It is therefore nothing but what I should expect when I see the press work of your Union being the banner press work—as far as I can judge at present of the State. I must congratulate you then on your press superintendent, and I hope you will manage to keep her in the place she fills so well—always. I am heartily in accord with the new plan she has devised, that of separating the newspaper matter—the supplies from the "personnel" of the W. C. T. U. by no longer labelling it with the well known and often carefully avoided initial letters. I am glad to hear that the plan has answered so well, by her having so many more appreciative readers. I am likewise glad to think that the papers go out beyond your own community—where all are probably reminded with yourselves, into the country at large. I trust the work may be the means of bringing in many votes for good true office bearers both in town and country. Our liquor laws as they stand to-day on the Oregon Statute book are good enough to demand hearty enforcement. The Sunday law; selling liquor to minors, with the strengthening penalty clause added by the late legislature; the law prohibiting the sale or gift of tobacco to minors; and others ought not to stand like dead nutes confronting us. If they could but be permeated with life, and were made a terror to evildoers, the saloon power would be short of its strength, and we should find ourselves that much nearer prohibition by our endeavors. A gentleman from Missouri told me the other day that the good temperance people in the town he came from set about having the liquor laws enforced—just such salutary laws as we have here today—and the saloon keepers found themselves pressed so hard thereby, that within a year there was not a saloon in the town; they all succumbed to the law abiding and the enforcing element that prevailed. I noticed that your city obtained a charter at the late legislature, I hope it is one that you can all endorse, and one that you will be proud to fight under. We have had ours here in Corvallis amended. We are hoping great things therefrom, for it will now give the city power to fight the saloon, it never had before. I wish you God's blessing on your work, and pray that it may be given to all of us, the power to encourage and uphold one another in the task we have set before ourselves, reminding each other that the almighty God is our strong helper, and that "He can bring mighty things to pass."
