Yamhill County Convention.

The Yamhill County Woman's Christian Temperance Union met in convention in the Christian church at Amity, April 14-15. Amity, Carlton, Dayton, McMinnville and Newberg were represented by full delegations, and most cordially received by the people of Amity. North Yamhill, recently organized, was the only union in the county not represented. The County President, Mrs. A. M. Woodward, being absent, Mrs. M. E. Edwards presided. A praise and thanksgiving service preceded the formal opening of the convention. Roll-call of officers showed but few of the superintendents of departments present. The following committees were appointed: On Credentials, On Resolutions, On Nominations, On Courtesy, On Time and Place. The committee on Credentials at once entered upon its labors. Pending their report, the President introduced Mrs. Delle C. H. Cox, of Newberg, who made brief remarks. After the report of committee on Credentials, Noonday prayer was observed, and the Convention proceeded to the parlors of the church where a bountiful lunch, prepared by the ladies of Amity and vicinity, was served. Afternoon devotions conducted by Mrs. Julia L. Snyder, McMinnville. Business opened at 1:30 p. m., minutes of previous session read and approved. Reports of Local Presidents were next in order. A synopsis of their reports was ordered sent to the State Corresponding Secretary before the State convention in May. The Treasurer's report was then read and accepted. A copy of the State organ of the W. C. T. U.—The Oregon White Ribbon, was introduced and Mrs. McKune, of Amity, appointed to solicit subscriptions at the convention. A. M. Morris was appointed to report for the several newspapers in the county. Mr. Cook, of McMinnville, was introduced to the Convention, and made brief remarks. The committee on Courtesy introduced Mr. Round, of Newberg, who declined to take the time by making a speech. Report of Scientific Instruction was read by the Secretary, as was also the report of Narcotics. An animated discussion followed the reading of the latter report. Mrs. Cox, who was formerly State superintendent of Narcotics in Kansas, said that she hoped the time would soon come when no teacher who is a tobacco user will be granted a certificate to teach school.

Wednesday morning devotions were conducted by Mrs. Louise P. Round, and were very impressive. Business session opened at 6 o'clock with the President in chair. Reports of Superintendents were continued. These reports show good work done in many lines. The Convention then proceeded to the election of officers for the coming year, the result of which is given above. The Committee Time and Place report that the next County Convention will be held at Carlton some time in April 1892, subject to change by the executive committee. Report of Nominating Committee is given above. We have not space for a full report of the Resolution Committee. They resolved to endorse the State Plan of work; also the organ of the W. C. T. U.—The Oregon White Ribbon and thank the editors who kindly have published temperance items and notices in their papers. The Mother's Meeting at 1 o'clock p. m. was conducted by Mrs. Lucy Haworth, who chose for her subject "Unanswered Prayer." Much interest was manifested. A question box was conducted by Mrs. Louise P. Round and Mrs. Delle C. H. Cox. The convention closed with "God be with you 'till we meet again." The evening session of the convention was addressed by Mrs. Edwards and Mrs. Cox, both speaking on the subject of Revenue and License, a fitting theme for a lecture in a small town where there are three licensed saloons. A very pretty solo was sung by Mrs. Davis, of Amity. "Twas Rum that Spoiled my Boy." Solo, "The Summer Time is Passing By." was well rendered by Miss Nettie Barnum of McMinnville. A vote of thanks was tendered the members of Amity Brass Band, who discoursed sweet music in the Park near the church while the crowd was gathering for the evening session. At the close of the lectures the pledge was circulated and some names secured.
