The display of wheat and oats has never been as extensive at our annual gatherings as it ought to be and we hope some of our farmers will see that a better display is made in this department this year. Farmers from the east are always anxious to see the quality of grain we raise.

They have labels after the California style that are neat and attractive to the eye and their cans when placed on a grocer's shelf along with those of other packing houses will never suffer by the comparison. The Newberg Packing Co. is here to stay and we are glad to see them starting out on a solid footing.

That the man who was burned in the McKern house a few weeks ago was first murdered, is believed by all our citizens. If this is a correct conclusion some person or persons committed the murder, and it seems to us that unless our people raise a purse to pay the expenses of an investigation and prosecute the case we are criminally negligent in the matter. While G. M. McCullough has been held for the crime we don't say he is guilty, but money ought to be raised to induce the parties managing the case to probe it to the bottom, and let the truth prevail. It is not the business of Thompson and Cox to spend their time and money in trying to bring the guilty parties to justice any more than it is that of any other law abiding citizen, and those of us who are not inclined to work at the case actively ourselves ought to be willing to assist with our money those who are willing to work the case up. The Relation of Temperance to Labor.

The aims of the dept. of "The Relation of Temperance to Labor" is to elevate the laborer and dignify labor. To convince employers that it is for their interest to require total abstinence of those in their employ and to show by convincing fact and figures that prohibition is a mighty factor in the solution of the liquor traffic. To endeavor to get the golden rule carried into action in the lives of every christian employer as an example of right christian living to the non-christian. Our present industrial system is wrong and needs righting, men were created, not for mutual opposition and deadly strife, but for co-operation and harmonious social life. Advancing civilization involves ever closer and closer mutual dependence what a mockery does it seem for all the pulpits of the land to preach the "love to the neighbors" on Sunday, while hosts of church goers, professed christians, take every possible advantage of one another in business every day of the remaining six. Where is our boasted christianity, does not our intense individualism create pauperism? Is not society responsible for its own criminals? The selfish struggle for bare existence on the part of so many produces collision antagonism, the motto of the masses seems to be "every one for himself or starve" the golden rule is forgotten. Is it not time to make our reform movement more of an industrial movement. Every one who studies the situation of the hour, must feel the truth of the statement of the Patriot Magasin "that every political question is becoming a social question and every social question a religious one." The industrial troubles can be settled in no other way than by the carrying out into practice the principles embodied in the golden rule and the two great commandments. What are some of the important phases of the labor question?

1st Child labor—1,000,000 children in U. S. in factories, instead of schools, what relation is this to temperance, inquire into the cause of this child labor, and in a large majority of cases it is due to drunken parents, or in some way directly or indirectly to the liquor traffic. Have the W. C. T. U. women no work here?

2nd Convict labor is lowering wages in many industries, as the honest laborer's work is placed in competition with the convicts, what relation here? Close the saloons and it will solve much of the difficulty of the vexed convict question.

3rd Long hours, the laborer asks for 8 hours work, shut up the open saloon and you strike out the biggest argument of the anti 8 hour people. It must be acknowledged that 8 hours work, more hours leisure with an open saloon would not be an unmissable blessing.

Sabbath Observance is worked for by our workers—in connection with this we need a half holiday for the laborer on Saturday. A laborer who has no time for recreation at all except on Sunday, will perhaps be pardoned if he goes to the woods on Sunday instead of the church. Again law wages for working women. Unequal pay among men and women, women are pleading for equal wages for equal work. Again let our women see that they have Sabbath observance in our kitchen. These few thoughts will start us into thinking the need of this dept., and yet this is but a simple fraction of a great whole.
