Fruit men are learning this to their credit and profit.

Hon. E. W. Allen said he hoped we would be able to show double the number of babies next year.

The ball game on Thursday between the home club and the Dayton nine was well attended. The score stood 12 to 16 in favor of Newberg. Our boys had arranged for an amateur game on Friday with the LaFayette club, having played two games with them during the season.
