Neither of these two had shaved for two weeks. The third had brown hair, small grey eyes, burnside whiskers, scar on chin or under lip, wore blue overalls and a new pair of grained boots. All rode grey or roanish grey horses. One horse has a sore caused by the cinch, one shod in front, branded A. F. on snout; head of one fore foot cracked.
