The next Dept. taken up was "Hygiene and Heredity," by Mrs. Cox, which was very interesting and instructive. Adjourned to meet at 7:30 p. m. The evening session consisted of an address by Mrs. Riggs, circulation of World's petition, benediction by the pastor Rev. Horner. Friday's program consisted of discussing the other Dept's of the W. C. T. U. work, all being very beneficial to the members present. The bible reading in the afternoon on Sabbath Observance, by Mrs. L. Ella Hartley, of Newberg, was considered the very best of the Convention. Some important subjects had to be postponed for want of time. The evening session was taken up by short addresses from Mrs. Foster, Mrs. Unruh, Mrs. Edwards, and others. This closed the convention and every one went home very glad that they had gone and grateful to the Sheridan Union for kind treatment and royal entertainment while there.

STATE HORTICULTURAL MEETING AT DALLAS.

The third quarterly meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural Society, was held at Dallas, Polk county, Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. The citizens of Dallas gave the members of the society cordial reception and entertained them in a royal style. The opera house, where the meeting was held, contained a large and fine display of flowers and fruits that were a credit to the place and showed very plainly that the county of Polk is located in the heart of the great Willamette valley. The sessions were largely attended and the papers and discussions were very interesting, the address of Prof. J. F. Campbell, of Monmouth, on "Agriculture the Primary Source of Wealth," being unusually interesting and instructive. The fruit posts came in for the larger portion of the discussions some pertinent points brought out, especially by E. W. Allen, Sec. of State Board of Horticulture, who told the fruit growers that the reason the price of apples was so low was because there was no good fruit for market. The Board of Horticulture has sent back fruits from Cal. that were invested with pests, and that Oregon can not expect to ship pest invested fruit to other states. The meeting adjourned to meet at Portland in January.
