THE CODLIN MOTH.

We hear some of our people remark, in speaking of the destructive work of the codlin moth, that they have no faith in spraying. There is no question but that spraying if done often and at the proper time will save the fruit. S. A. Clark, of Salem, in an article on this subject says:

Last spring I gave in the Oregonian my observations of the codlin moth, showing that while the moths matured and developed about May 1, and the worms should have commenced work by June 1, they did not actually appear and begin operations for a month later. When discussing this fact with Prof. Washburn, of the agricultural college, he suggested spraying the trees June 1, or sooner. I nearly destroyed the first broods, and so kept them back, but this could not well explain the matter, as worms did not generally begin work earlier than with me, so the rule applies throughout the valley in all orchards, and the delay in the appearance of these worms was as apparent in orchards not sprayed at all as where spraying was done thoroughly and often. My orchard was sprayed from the last week in May to the middle of September, at least seven or eight times, with a solution of Paris green, one pound to 200 gallons. There were quite a number of wormy apples, and where they hung in clusters, touching each other, it was not possible to prevent the worms getting between them. Many fell off, and I began to fear the worms would have their own way, but when it came to saving the fruit and preparing it for market, the pickers found that nearly all the apples, on the trees were in good order and free from worms. I am satisfied that most of the fruit was saved by the spraying. While there is no reason to doubt that efficient spraying will save fruit, it is true that we are not yet well posted as to the habits of the apple worm. What we need is some reliable information as to when trees should be sprayed and when the apple worm is ready to begin work. Much doubt and expense will be saved to the grower if he can be told when spraying should begin. It is plain enough that when once begun it should be repeated twice a month until September, and perhaps once in that month.
