The school adjourned Thursday for Thanksgiving.

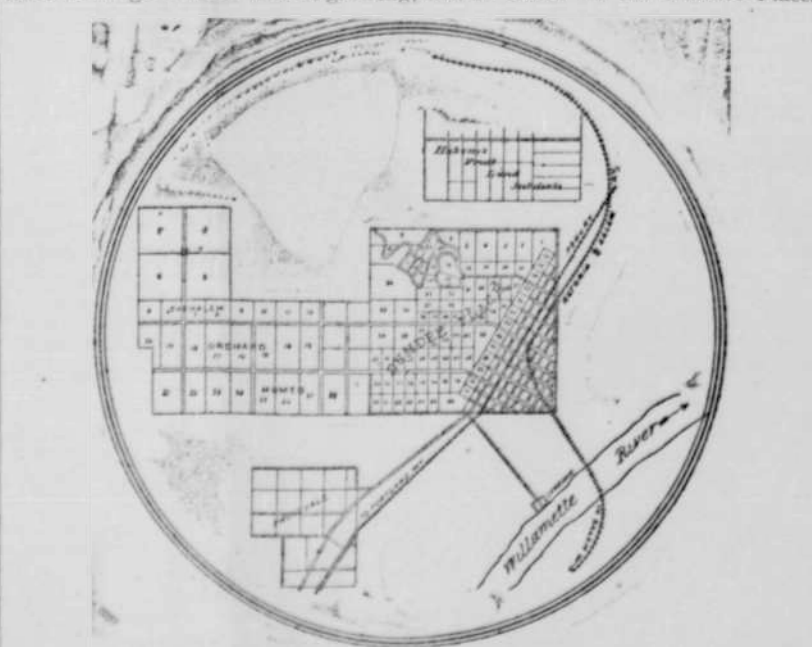
Ellis Kauffman and George Rogers have left school. They will be missed, as they were both industrious scholars.
