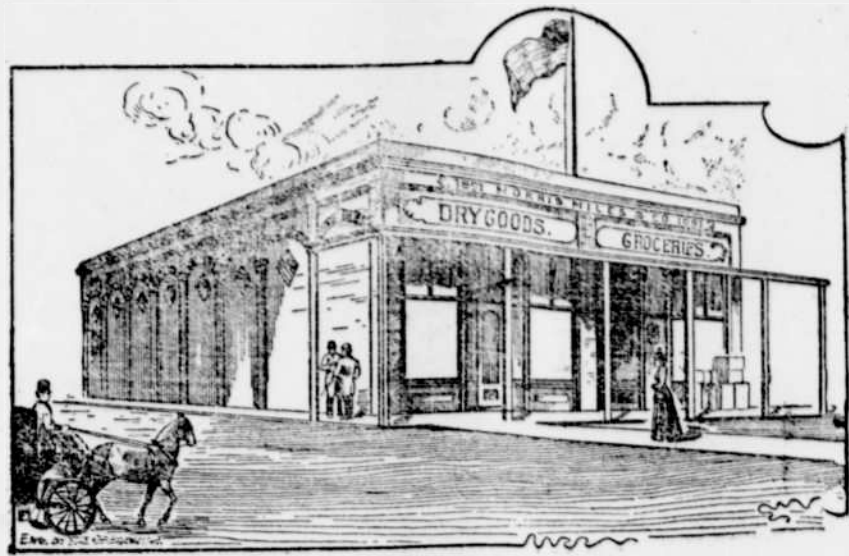

A Question.

It is also claimed that it is very unsatisfactory to throw pupils of all sizes and ages together, especially where schools are located in town, where the room for play grounds must necessarily be limited. The annual school meeting is only about four weeks off and we mention the subject in order to call the attention of all who are interested in the school, to this matter in due time, so that it may be fully discussed before-hand, all points on both sides brought out and proper conclusions arrived at. 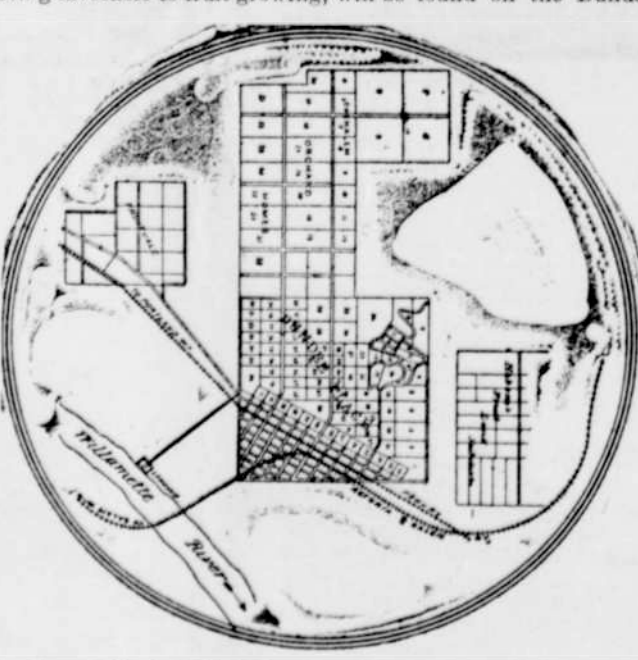
