The Woodburn Independent says "sa-

quickly." Yes, and like lice they live off
of the vitality of others, giving nothing
but discomfort in return.

So far as we have heard, the change
made by the county court in the manner
of working the roads meets with favor
among people in this part of the county.
Give the plan a thorough trial and we be-
lieve it will be a success.

That once powerful institution, the
Louisiana lottery, will soon be no more.
The statement is made by John A. Mor-
ris, prominent in the concern, that owing
to the opposition in the state they will
withdraw their application for a recharter.

BEN LONGLEY, of Union county, re-
ceived a prize of \$100 for the finest potato
grown in the United States. If Pat in
his home across the sea knew of the pos-
sibilities of Irish potato culture in Oregon
soil he would not doubt be more num-
erous in our state.

BLAINE has written a letter to Chair-
man Clarkson, of the republican national
committee, formally announcing that he
is not a candidate for the republican pre-
sidential nomination. This practically
leaves the field clear for the re-nomina-
tion of President Harrison.

SENATOR FLEMING's resolution on the re-
moval of General Grant's remains to Ar-
lington has been taken off the calendar,
there being no one to support it. While
General Grant was a public man, it would
seem that if the public had him during
life, his wife's wishes should be consulted
as to the disposal of his remains now that
he is dead.

The time is not far off when the county
conventions will be held, and it is but
natural that the people will be looking
about for candidates for the various
offices. So far we have heard but little
said about probable candidates from any
place in the county, but if history repeats
itself there will be plenty found, who will
be willing to serve the dear people.

One of the most remarkable decisions ever
made by a United States Judge, was
rendered on the 5th inst, by Judge
Knowles, in the case of a white man who
sold beer to an Indian. Judge Knowles
decided that there was no law against sell-
ing beer to Indians, as the Federal
statutes provide only a penalty for sell-
ing spirituous liquor or wine to an In-
dian.

MITCHELL has been chosen to guide the
destinies of the Portland exposition for
another year. It is to be hoped that he
will treat the newspaper fraternity of the
state a little more courteously than in the
past, and if the expo. paid as handsomely
as his report would indicate, we hope
to see a little more cash expended in
newspaper advertising, and less of the
fence board and fir tree variety.

PERRY MASON & Co., publishers of the
Youth's Companion, are building a home
for their paper in Boston, which will be
fully equipped for the publishing business
and will be one of the grandest buildings
in that city. More than thirty tons of
paper are required to print each issue of
the Companion and 200 people are en-
gaged in the printing, folding and mail-
ing departments. Perry Mason & Co.,
advertise their business.

The friends of Lewis Hoskins know
that he would fill the office of County
Clerk with credit to himself and in a
manner satisfactory to the public, and
consequently will present his name to the
republican convention for consideration.
Mr. Hoskins is thoroughly competent to
fill the office and would make an obliging
official. Never in our knowledge of Yan-
hill county affairs has there been an office
held by anyone from this part of the
county, in which there was money
enough to pay expenses or at least but lit-
tle more, and we believe that the candi-
dacy of Lewis Hoskins will be looked up-
on with favor from other parts of the
county.

A so-called official representative of the
"liberals of Oregon," who, by the way
are the most bigoted class of people
on earth, takes occasion through the col-
umns of the Forest Grove Times, to just-
ify those who make false property reports
to assessors, on the ground that the
churches set the example by paying no
taxes. If some of these self-styled lib-
erals would not allow themselves to be so
blinded by their prejudices against the
churches they could find any number of
points where reform work is needed more
than in the taxation of church property.
Taking the whole country over it cuts a
very insignificant figure, but it serves to
keep before the tongues and pens of a class
of people who, if they were really what
they profess to be, would spend their time
and talents in broader fields of reform.

Isn't there a bit of inconsistency in the
law that makes it an offense to sell liquor
to a drunken man, but which licenses an
individual to make men drunk? If one
is wrong, considered from a moral stand-
point, then the other is equally wrong.
If a penalty is provided for the selling of
liquor, it should be in the case of the
man who incapacitates his brother for the
exercise of his natural faculties, just as
much as for him who takes advantage of
his helpless condition. If there is any
personal liberty infringement at all, it
should be where it will do the most good.

FARMERS throughout the United States
have had a hard pull of it to keep their
heads above the waves for several years.
It is interesting to note that during the
past year fortune seems to have smiled
on the tiller of the soil.
"During the month of October, 1891,
the farm mortgages filed in Nebraska
amounted to \$25,223; mortgages cancel-
ed, \$105,157; difference, \$105,934. Dur-
ing the month of November, 1891, mor-
gages filed, \$41,769; mortgages canceled,
\$105,355; difference, \$64,165. During the
month of December, 1891, mortgages
filed, \$30,719; mortgages canceled, \$158,
237; difference, \$107,518. Total paid out
during three months to liquidate mort-
gage indebtedness, \$335,547. The farm-
ers are not quite bankrupt yet."

protect his wife until death should sepa-
rate them. The editor appeals to the
people for help for the unfortunate wife
and her helpless children, but continues
to carry an advertisement of a saloon,
"established in 1866" as the proprietor
informs the public. Why not go a
step further brother editor and ask your
readers to remove the root of the evil
from your midst? First however take
that advertisement out of your paper and
refuse to assist the man who is taking the
money from the victim you speak of and
giving in return that which makes his life
a failure and his family miserable.

Newberg Fair.
It has been decided to form a stock
company and incorporate the Newberg
Fair Association. It seems necessary to
do this in order to keep the fair going, as
it has grown to be too big a thing to run
on the old plan, unless the people would
show the liberality toward the association
that they did when there were less than
half the people in the community than
we now have. People have grown
indifferent and fail to pay their subscrip-
tions to the fund for supporting the fair
and as a fair will not run entirely on
wind, some changes in plans for conduct-
ing it seem an absolute necessity. We
have always believed and still think that
a fair conducted on the plan carried out
in the past is a great benefit to a
community. It affords an opportunity
for all, rich and poor, young and old, big
and little, to get together for two or three
days once each year, examine and com-
pare the samples of products of the past
years toil and labor, without money and
without price. Of course if a company is
formed the go as you please plan will be
discarded and some will be shut out on
account of the cost of attending although
it may be small. There were expenses
incurred last year however that must be
met and as the public has failed to re-
spond, it seems to be an absolute neces-
sity to change the plans for the future.
A great many people say they would
prefer that a stock company was formed
rather than to be asked each year for a
donation to keep the fair going, so there
will be a change made and our people
will have a chance to see which plan
works the best. One thing is certain, our
people don't want the fair to close out
and stop running, however slack they may
be in giving the proper support to it. We
hope the stock company will be formed
and the undertaking put on a solid basis.

Laundry Lessons.
Put white clothes to soak over night in
tub of cold water with a tablespoonful of
powdered borax in each tub.
Iron white clothes on the right side, but
collars, gingham, etc., on the wrong
side to produce the lustrous effect seen
in the new material before it has been
laundered.

White silk handkerchiefs must not be
dampened but pressed with a moderate
iron when entirely dry.
Tuck stain and iron mould must have a
plaster of lemon juice and salt applied,
and then be put in the sun.
Do not rub flannels on a board. The
main thing is quick drying, and that they
be washed and rinsed in water of the
same temperature very quickly, and not
allowed to cool between.

In making starch, boil it at least one
hour, then add a teaspoonful of powdered
borax to half a gallon of starch. Clothes
done up in this starch will have a pecu-
liar soft stiffness, and will not "moss" as
soon as you put them on.—American Fair-
way.

Col. E. D. Baker, one of the first sena-
tors from Oregon, who fell early in the
struggle for the Union while leading a
desperate charge at Ball's Bluff, sleeps in a
neglected almost unmarked grave, in
Lone Mountain Cemetery, San Francisco.
It is now proposed to remove the remains
to Golden Gate Park and erect a suitable
monument. Would it not be more ap-
propriate to bring Col. Baker's remains
to Oregon and erect a monument to him,
say at the state capital?—Oregon Courier.

The poles have been put in place this
week and a force of men have begun to
receive the light. Over 500 lights have
been contracted for and the committee
have not fully canvassed the town. Two
dynamos, a generator and a new 75 horse
power engine have been purchased and
are being put in place. Only the best
material is being used and before the first
of March Forest Grove can boast of the
best electric plant in the state.—Forest
Grove Times.

The purser of the Lurline tells a story
which well illustrates the difference be-
tween eastern and western Oregon.
About two years ago an old lady got on
the boat at the Cascades, on her way to
the valley, and a friend sang out: "Hel-
lo! Mrs. Blank; where are you going?"
"Going where there is water to wash my
clothes; we don't have enough for that
in Eastern Oregon," was the reply.
About a month after she was a passenger
on the Lurline going back. The purser
said: "How do you do, Mrs. Blank?"
"Have you got your washing done?"
"Yes," said the old lady, "I have and
now I am going back east of the moun-
tains to get my clothes dry."—Capital
Journal.

England's great prosperity, over which
the American Cobdenites become so en-
thusiastic, is well illustrated by the fol-
lowing statistics but recently gathered:
In Great Britain there are 700,000 crim-
inals, 22,000 juvenile. The annual cost of
liquors is \$750,000,000, and there are 509,
000 drunkards. Suicides last year num-
bered 2,297, and 2157 were found dead;
10,000 children died from violence or neg-
lect; 1,837,332 persons were in receipt of
pauper relief of some kind, a proportion
of about 1 in every 16 of the population.
Of this number 507,660 were over 65
years of age, and as the total population
over 65 years is 1,322,695, we see that out
of every 3 men in England who live to be
65 years old 1 is a pauper. In addition,
over 3,000,000 people are so wretchedly
poor that they can hardly be said to
exist.—American Economist.

has been accomplished in the past four
years, in the building and furnish-
ing of an \$80,000 court house, and the
amount of bridge work done in the past
two years, it is not a wonder that taxes
have been a little higher. And when it is
further considered that the county is
practically out of debt to-day, the
conviction must force itself home, that
the affairs of Yamhill county have been
managed judiciously and honestly admin-
istered. Probably no county in the state
is better conducted.—Reporter.

variety by the introduction of the banjo

Last Tuesday we took a walk along the
narrow gauge railway as far as the first
low trestle south of the railroad bridge on
the Cook and Fletcher farms and found
a gang of men employed in filling in the
space between the road bed and ground.
A culvert of the most substantial kind
has been made with large rocks neatly
fitted. On the bottom, large stone flags
are laid, then the sides are laid with large
rocks hammered so as to fit very nicely,
then on the top are laid large flags of
stone, making in all a very durable cover-
ing for the water. No doubt this will be a
great improvement over the present trest-
le, and in a place of a destructive flood,
there will be an indestructible road bed. The
job will last for some time, as there is
a large amount of clay to move. But
the good work seems to be progressing,
and all points to the determination on
the part of the Southern Pacific to make
this part of the road second to none in
