

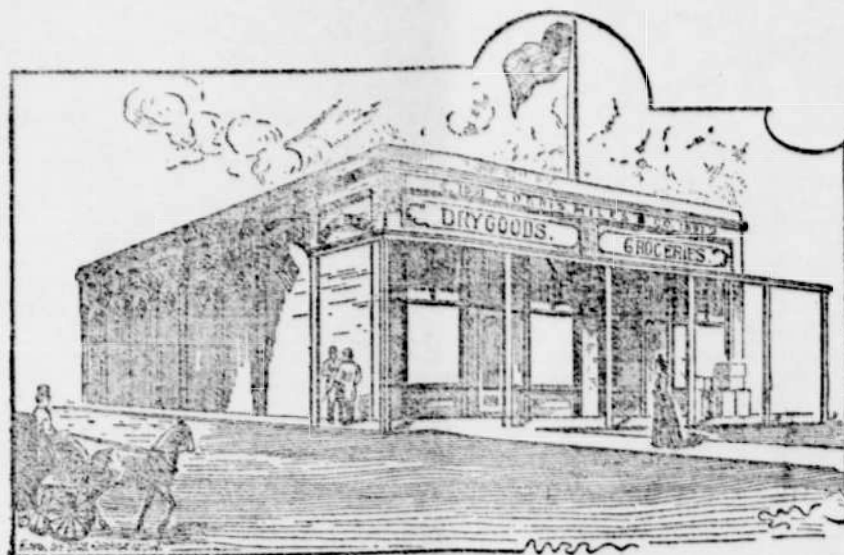

Teachers Institute.

The local teacher's institute held here last week was opened on Friday night with a lecture by Prof. Kantner, of La Fayette Seminary, the subject chosen being "Homes." The subject was well handled by the speaker and although he used manuscript his delivery was good. The lecture was well received by the large audience present and it is safe to say Prof. Kantner will be well received if he should lecture here again. County Superintendent Baker presided and the music was furnished by the choir from the Seminary. Good music is always expected when the LaFayette singers are here and the audience was not disappointed on this occasion, as the repeated cheers indicated hearty appreciation. Our people invited the visitors to remain over night, but they chose to drive home that night.

The program as published last week was carried out on Saturday and the exercises were full of interest to the teachers as well as others who were in attendance. Those taking the most active part in the discussions were L. H. Baker, President Newlin, Prof. Hartley, Prof.

Hodson, Mrs. Martin, Mrs. Hartley and Miss Townsend. In the absence of Prof. Jessup, who was at Salem attending the College Y. M. C. A., his paper, "Science Teaching in Public Schools," was read by Edith Ellis. Superintendent Baker in a talk on good discipline took the following as his topics, "Introduction, System, Energy, Vigilance, Self Control, Confidence, Culture of Mind and Heart, Managing Power, Tact and Will Power," with the last two heavily underscored.

The sentiment of the institute was that the schools of the county should be graded by the county superintendent and a committee composed of Miles Reese, Prof. Hodson and Mrs. Martin was appointed to draft resolutions expressing the wish of those in attendance on this subject to be presented to superintendent Baker.

On the suggestion of President Newlin it was decided to organize a local teacher's institute and a committee composed of President Newlin, Mrs. Martin and Miss Deskins was appointed to draft a constitution. They were also given the power to call a meeting at their pleasure. The attendance during the day was very good, but there were others who ought to have been in attendance.

Obituary.

William Jones was born in Kentucky, August 25, 1811, and moved to Indiana in 1826. He married Nancy Davis in Harrison county, Ind., in the year 1830. He moved to Iowa in 1840, and crossed the plains to Oregon in 1847, and settled in Chehalis valley, Yamhill county, where he spent the remainder of his life. He died on the 19th of February 1892, at the age of 80 years, 5 months and 24 days.

He became a christian in 1842, and joined the Christian church, to which he belonged at the time of his death. To him and his wife, who died in 1869, were born eight children, six of whom are still living. He made his home, after he lost his companion, with some of his children until his death which occurred on the above date at his son-in-law, David Everest, near Newberg, Oregon.

He had been troubled some with fainting spells, but was not sick. He seemed very quiet and peaceful for some days, and the day previous to his departure, he spent largely in reading his Bible, as though he were expecting his summons, and wished to know more about the way. The above evidences and thoughtfulness gives the bereaved a consolation in believing that he is now at rest.

On the 19th inst, he slept most of his time, but near 3 p. m. he walked into the yard and fell to the ground. He was promptly carried into the house, but breathed his last in a few minutes without a word. His funeral services were conducted by G. S. Hartley on the 21st, at the residence of David Everest. He was buried at the Jacob Shuck cemetery, near Dundee, by the side of his long departed companion.

All his children, four daughters and two sons, with many grandchildren were present. His only surviving brother, Fiddling Jones, who lives on the other side of the river, did not get to the funeral. The services consisted of a song, "Only Waiting," followed by prayer and the reading of the 4th chapter of 2nd Thessalonians, beginning with the 13th verse, and ending with the 16th of the 5th chapter, followed by a discourse from St. Luke xii, 40. Song, "Jesus Lover of My Soul."

Samuel Hoffman, of Iowa, whose father was here last fall looking up a site for locating a flouring mill arrived here this week. It is hoped that he will give the proposition made him by citizens of this place due consideration before locating elsewhere.—*Herald*.
