**THE RASPBERRY.**  
This berry is among the best of small fruits, is easily raised and comes into bearing early and at the time of year when the scarcity of fruits make it valuable.

There are two classes of this fruit, the Antwerp and the Cape. The Antweps are mostly red and are produced by sprouting like the blackberry. This berry is not usually considered as good as the black Caps but is earlier and is prized by none on that account. The leading kinds of this class are the Hamsell, Turner and Cuthbert for early medium and late in the order named. The red berry is much softer and juicier than the black which make them a poor berry for market, yet they are fine for home use, variety, and to increase the length of the berry season.

Of the black Caps there are a great many kinds and like all other fruits (except for variety) one should confine his selection to a very few kinds. This class reproduces by means of tips of vines or canes reaching the ground in the fall, which very tip takes root and by transplanting the following spring the best plants are obtained. As to cultivation this is a very simple task yet I find that there are a great many who know but very little about the habits of growth of even the raspberry. The raspberry and blackberry are both biennial and perennial. The canes are biennial, growing one year fruiting the next and then dying, while the roots are perennial or perpetual.

The ground should be rich for best results and should be kept loose by frequent stirring and as we have no freezing weather in winter to loosen the ground it is indispensable to success to use artificial means. As to pruning, this is perhaps the most particular part of the whole work, for if delayed till the canes are full grown and then cut back, there is great danger of the canes taking water and killing them, as there is a large amount of pith, but the proper time is when the young canes are two or two and one-half feet high, when the tip should be pinched off and the round will heal over nicely and no water will enter, and by toping at this height it causes side shoots at every leaf, thus forming a nice stocky plant on which you get your fruit the following season. The side shoots should be cut back in spring to within one foot of main stock, and the old canes should be left taken off as soon as the fruit is gathered to give room for the new canes which should not exceed five or six to the hill.

Stiffers Colossal, although a compromise between the black and red, is considered the best family berry of its class in the east and it is really fine here, but for a general purpose berry the *Groeg* is the best berry I have any knowledge of.

having fruited it both in Illinois and Oregon. I can recommend it as a berry that will give satisfaction and be a paying crop. While there may be other kinds that are nearly or quite as good, yet it is large, of good flavor, very fine, a good bearer and entirely hardy, and is thought both east and west to be the leading raspberry.

Now as we have a canny here and small fruits are easily and quickly raised it seems to me that the raspberry could be very profitably grown in connection with our larger fruits, and thus help make a living while other trees are being cultivated. Now for fear some one will think I am grinding my ax I will say no plants for sale. C. M.

**THE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.**  
The eleventh annual Sunday School Convention of Yamhill county met at Friends' church on Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 and was called to order by Mrs. Gilkey of Weibfoot Sunday school, near Dayton. Mrs. Gilkey who is one of the most energetic Sunday school teachers of the county, has a happy, free and easy manner which she carries with her wherever she goes and these same characteristics which make her friends everywhere are noticeable in her work as a presiding officer.

President Newlin delivered the address of welcome in his characteristic way, which, judging from the pleasant smiles of the young lady delegates, and from the contented expressions of satisfaction on the visages of the Reverend gentlemen present, as he referred to the store of good things in the way of pie and cake and chicken "fixes" that the good housewives had prepared, was entirely satisfactory to the visiting delegates. The response was made by Rev. Hoberg of McMinnville, the father of Sunday school conventions in Yamhill county, he having set the movement on foot and has attended every one of the eleven conventions held. Rev. Hoberg never fails to give this part of the county credit for having developed faster in Sunday school and church work than any other part of the county. He said the time was when the "grubby end of Chehalis," as this locality was called, cost the county in criminal litigation more than all the rest of the county together. That this was a locality notorious for cattle thieves and that an honest man was hardly safe in passing through the valley. He fixed the date of the beginning of the change for the better in the valley at a time about fifteen years ago, when he first met the late Wm. Hobson. Rev. Hoberg's response was full of interest and was well received.

**PACIFIC COLLEGE.**  
The above named institution is now incorporated under the laws of Oregon and will in the future be in a position to give diplomas that will be of the same advantage to students, who desire certificates to teach, as other colleges give.

Heretofore five Trustees have composed the Board, but since being incorporated, the State law requires nine, and consequently the following have been elected: G. W. Mitchell, J. H. Townsend, Jesse Edwards, M. Votaw, Jesse Hobson, Mrs. Yvonne Martin, Mrs. A. L. Hoskins, Paul Macy and E. H. Woodward, and the law making the president of the college, Prof. Thomas Newlin, an ex-officio member of the board, makes ten in all. E. H. Woodward was elected president of the board and Mrs. Martin secretary and the work has been divided with committees as follows: Executive Committee, E. H. Woodward, Mrs. Martin, Jesse Edwards, G. W. Mitchell and Paul Macy. Faculty and Officers, President Thomas Newlin, Jesse Edwards, and E. H. Woodward. Buildings and Grounds, Jesse Edwards, J. H. Townsend and Paul Macy. Museum and Laboratory, M. Votaw, G. W. Mitchell, Mary L. Hoskins. Library, J. H. Townsend, Jesse Hobson and Mary L. Hoskins.

It is expected that a financial agent will be put in the field at an early date to increase the endowment fund and put the college on a more solid financial basis. The work of the college this year has been the most satisfactory ever yet done in the history of the school and it is expected to equip the institution for still better work next year. An effort will be made to add to the library, and steps are also being taken to send a party to the John Day country in eastern Oregon to make a collection of the fine geological specimens in which the region along the John Day river is so rich. The old established eastern colleges are sending parties there each year to make collections and it is proposed that Pacific College shall share with the rest. A larger number of students have already been classified for the spring term than usual and the prospect is bright for the remainder of the school year.
