The New System.
C. W. Talmage, of McMinnville, who was in town last week said there seemed to be some dissatisfaction in some parts of the county regarding the system of road work adopted by the county court this year. We don't know how it may be in other parts, but we have to hear of the first complaint coming from this neck of the woods regarding the system. Those we have heard express themselves on the subject say that much better results may be realized under the present system than in the old way. The general impression seems to be that Paul Macy is proving to be the right man for the place and is doing good work that will be of lasting benefit to the roads. One advantage of the new system that may easily be seen, is in getting the work done where and when in the judgment of the supervisor, it ought to be performed. Under the old system it was next to impossible to get grading done early in the season, because farmers must plow and row grain just as early as the weather is fair and the ground dry enough, and consequently the road work has been put off until rains were past and the grading that was done made clouds of dust for the summer season and the softest of mud for early fall and winter. Now teams and men are hired and put on the roads when and where they will do the most good, working under one boss instead of forty, and if a man don't want to work in an agreeable way and do an honest day's work, he can "pass by on the other side," and look for another job. Many other advantages might be mentioned and we hope the people of the county will act wisely and give the new system a fair and impartial trial before condemning it.
