Dr. Rickard is pretty busy professionally just now, none dangerously ill though.

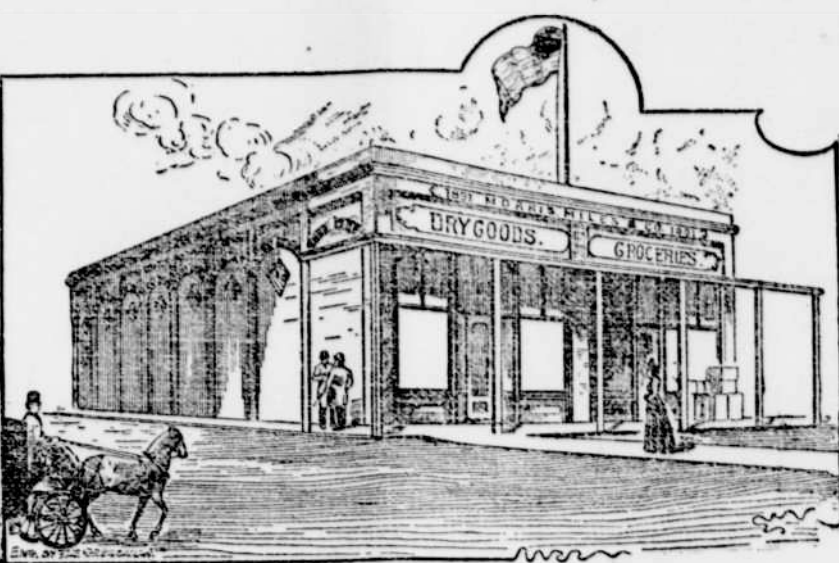
Martin Cook preached at Sherwood last Sabbath evening to a large, well behaved audience.
