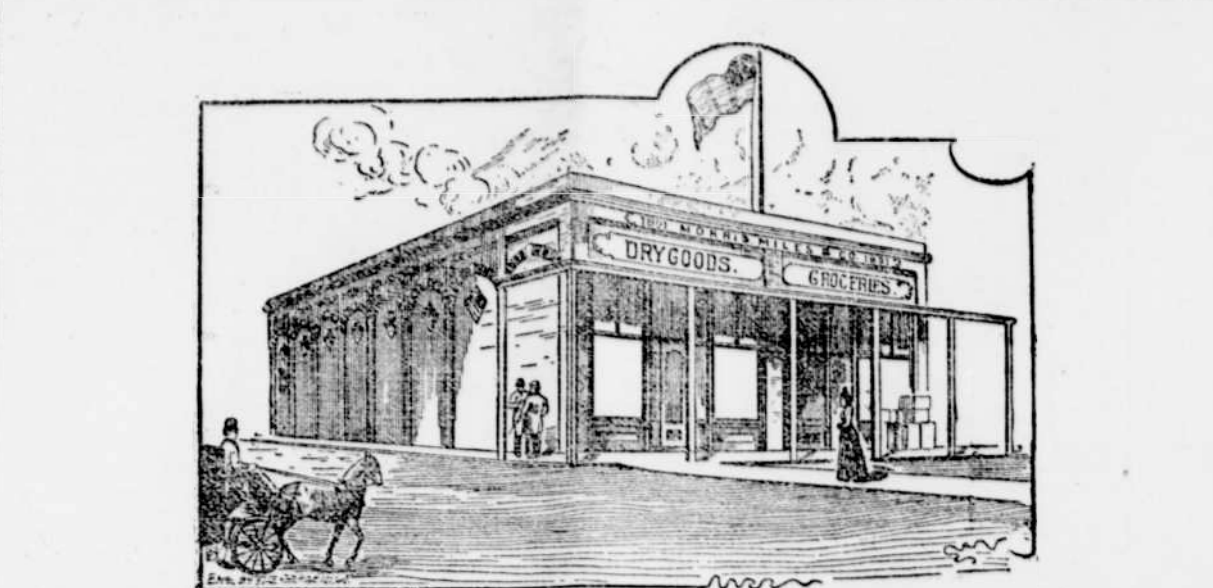


Local Events.
