As exchange says men who are in the employ of the government never strike. Just so. What better proof is needed that the government should control the railroads, where strikes are most common?

WASHINGTON has solved the convict problem, in so far as it makes this very troublesome class a benefit to the people of the state. At the penitentiary at Walla Walla convicts make grain sacks, which the farmers are enabled to buy about two cents cheaper than in former years.

ANOTHER argument against long or severe sentences on the ground of purely circumstantial evidence may be taken from the case of James F. Tipton, just pardoned from the Oregon penitentiary. He was sentenced in 1880 to 20 years for forgery, but affidavits have been made, proving his innocence beyond a doubt.

IT SEEMS that some people are not satisfied to let the action of congress in providing for the Sunday closing of the exposition pass by without a strong effort for its repeal, and a series of petitions are being prepared to be circulated for that purpose. Not an anarchist, a saloonist, a beer guzzling foreigner or a pickpocket but will sign such a remonstrance, and the few good but misguided people who perhaps may, will present a sorry spectacle when they appear before the world in company with the great majority of Sabbath desecrators. As for us, we are so thoroughly American to have any desire to ape the customs or practices of foreigners in their holiday making of the day which our fathers held sacred as a day of rest. If people are not satisfied with America or American customs, it is an easy matter to find a so-called civilization where the sacredness of the Sabbath, or the sanctity of the marriage relation, the life or property of others is not recognized, and where the anarchy and crime are fostered and the pestilence is bred and born, that, finding their way to America attempt to undermine the institutions of our government or spread disease and death among our people. It is not our form of civilization.

COLUMBUS DAY.
U. S. Commissioner Harris talks on its National Celebration.
Effective instruction in patriotism through the public schools is now a subject receiving the earnest consideration of educators throughout the country. All agree that some specific plan should be adopted for education in citizenship. Some of the most eminent educators believe that while all patriotic anniversaries are being fittingly observed, this plan should also include a daily ceremony of exercises

about the national flag. Others as eminent fear that the daily ceremony would become at last a meaningless form, and that the observance of the great occasions alone will better serve the purpose. Dr. W. T. Harris, United States Commissioner of Education is of the opinion that the broadest and truest patriotism must be stimulated by making use of special opportunities. In a recent interview, while the National Public School Celebration of Columbus Day was under discussion, he said:—

"I heartily indorse the idea of this celebration by the schools because I think all legitimate occasions should be used to impress on the minds of children their connection with the history of the world. Patriotism seems to me to be an individual's feeling of substantial interest in the welfare of his nation.
"We do not want any patriotism which gets in the way of the broader and more Christian sentiment of brotherly love toward all mankind. But patriotism is a more Christian sentiment than love of home, love of one's town, or county, or one's section. Very much of the so-called instruction in patriotism in the schools is apt to degenerate into self-glorification, or sectionalism. Our Fourth of July celebrations have too often cultivated a narrow patriotism. But this Columbian celebration is a far broader opportunity for stimulating the better kind of patriotism.
"I am not in favor of daily exercises in the school which look toward the cultivation of patriotism by some ceremonial, because I think that a daily ceremony is apt to become unconscious habit, and a mere empty form. A yearly celebration is far more impressive than a daily celebration, and the national celebration of the four hundredth anniversary must be still more so.
"In the exercises next October I think that impression will be made on the youth of America which will last a lifetime. I hope that everywhere the schools will take the lead in this demonstration. The schools may furnish the singing and appropriate declamations. In the preparation of these things very much historical work will be brought forward in the school, and to the very great advantage of the children."

PRUNING FROM EXPERIENCE.
Gues-work is never so sure as experience, as the following proves. It is a clipping from the Santa Maria Times:
N. H. Woods of Cat canyon has one of the oldest and most profitable apple orchards in this end of the county. He has a first class location and his trees have always received care and cultivation to the full extent of his knowledge. Several years ago he noticed that some of his hitherto healthiest trees were decaying in certain portions of the top where a limb had been cut off some time before. He made inquiries of his neighbors who told of similar troubles, but gave him no satisfactory reason. Mr. W. had a large orchard in bearing, and was dependent upon it, in a measure, for his subsistence. He was naturally somewhat alarmed at the disastrous showing made by some of his best trees, and resolved to solve the mystery, if possible. After a few years of experimenting, he found that by pruning his apple trees directly after the fruit is off, or when the leaves are falling, he could cut all the wood he wished to take off without injury to the tree. The wounds would heal up and no signs of decay would ever appear. He also found that by cutting off limbs, especially large ones, in February and March, the stub would frequently die back the first year to the main limb or to the trunk of the tree, and the next year the decay would extend to the heart of the tree so that where the limb grew originally there would be a hole from which decayed wood could be gouged out with a stick. This decaying process would extend to the roots of the tree by the third year and result either in the death of the tree or leave an unsightly snag struggling for existence, instead of the thrifty, profitable tree of old.

LETTER FROM E. H. WOODWARD.
OSKALOOSA, Ia., Sept. 12, 1892.—My route to this city from Minneapolis was by the great Albert Lea system by way of Cedar Rapids. Minnesota is a beautiful country along the route traveled, but a small amount of grain is raised compared with the big meadows and pasture lands. Lakes are numerous all along the line and very beautiful they are. The water in them is pure and clear and abound with fish of various kinds. The people wherever I have been are feeling splendidly, crops being very fair and times good. Money is plentiful and loans at a much lower rate of interest than in Oregon, six to seven per cent being about the average. North of Cedar Rapids in this state I saw some very fine country where corn and hogs are king. Corn as a rule is late, and will need a late fall for ripening. Corn rows are full of weeds owing to late planting and wet weather. Farmers are discouraged with cattle raising owing to continued low prices and attention is being turned more to hogs. Dairying is a big industry in Iowa and they know how to make good butter here. Have not found any bad butter either in this state or Minnesota. The Maracha

county fair was held here last week. The Republicans had a big rally one day and the Democrats the day following. This is the way they get crowds to attend the fairs in this country. Political excitement runs but little higher here however than in Oregon. Have seen probably a dozen campaign caps worn by small boys but hear scarcely anything said anywhere regarding the outlook without making special inquiry.

Oskaloosa claims a population of some eight thousand but to me the streets have rather a dilapidated appearance. I was so well taken with the place on arriving that I went into the real estate business at once and have kept it up ever since. Have been carrying a lot of it around on my shoes that has been difficult to shake off. Shoe blacking is a dull sale. The natural host of the mud is all sufficient. But this is a thundering country, have heard more rumbling of the elements the past five days than I have heard before in twelve years.

The attendance at the Yearly meeting of Friends church has been up to the average, they tell me, except on yesterday, (Sunday) the big rains of the day and night previous cut the numbers short. There must have been at least ten thousand on the grounds and a more orderly crowd I have never seen anywhere. Did not hear of a single disturbance of any kind. The church has a warm feeling for Friends church in Oregon which has been expressed in words here during the session at different times, and by an appropriation of \$2000 for the building fund for the new church at Newberg. Rev. J. H. Douglas and Dr. E. Jessup will attend other Yearly meetings further east, hoping to add more to the fund.

California Friends ask for the establishment of a Yearly meeting to be opened next year but it looks now like it would be referred back for further consideration. Prof. Thebets who is first assistant and who is pressing the claims of California is a cousin of B. C. Miles of our town. He made an excellent address at an educational meeting held Saturday. He will represent the church in California at the conference of Yearly meetings to be held at Indianapolis next month. Dr. Jessup will represent Oregon.

I have met a host of Prof. Jessup's old college mates who are diligent in their inquiries regarding his welfare, while they are legion who inquire for him and his family, forty-second cousins and mother-in-laws. It is pleasant to be able, almost without an exception to say yes "I know him."

Lately there has appeared quite a few Chinese in town, and in answering with them they all state that they are engaged to pick hops. This is the right thing; hire the almond-eyed gentlemen and let them depart with what they earned so they can buy rice and oil. In the meantime your neighbors and others who would be glad of the opportunity for a few weeks work will have to content them selves looking on. Strictly American, doncherknow.—Dayton News.
