Report of Missionary Meeting.
At the missionary meeting last Saturday afternoon, Mrs. Anna Cook reported a box of canned fruit had been sent to Mrs. Fannie Letter, Douglas City, Alaska. The regular monthly reports were omitted, and the time given to Elwood Weener, which he occupied fully one and a half hours.
The history of his trip to and from Alaska in connection with the recital of the progress and needs of the mission, was listened to with intense interest. The hearts of that benighted people are already warming toward our Fannie Letter, who makes regular visits to their wigwags along the beach, every other day, accompanied by her little interpreter from the home. The work which she began five years ago, has very far exceeded the expectations of its originators. The twenty children in the home have made much advancement in the way of civilization and learning, fully demonstrating the fact that mission work in Alaska is not in vain.
The question, "What is to become of these children when they are ready to leave this school," is weighing on the hearts of Brother Weener and other missionaries. To turn them out on the island, with the prevailing tide of evil influences about them does not seem the proper thing to do. The following proposition is being considered, viz. To purchase a farm and set it out to fruits making it self-supporting, the same to be located in a community with good moral and religious influences, where saloons are not tolerated.
There are already six children, who could be brought to a farm of this kind.

The vicinity of Newberg is recommended. If it meets the approval of the friends of the mission such farm may be established in the near future. A niece of John G. Whittier is much interested in the mission, and has deposited funds sufficient to erect a dormitory for boys when it is thought proper. EVANGELINE MARTIN.

Fair Notes.
The fair was a success notwithstanding the rains, but the stock of the association don't need any further watering at present.
As evidence that the association has the confidence of the public generally, we state that everyone from a distance who we heard express themselves, regretted that for the financial success of the fair alone, the weather could not be better. All things except the state of the weather were in favor of a successful exhibition.
The fruit display was smaller than at some other times. Owing partly to a smaller crop than the average, then superintendent Mills had married a wife and must needs be excused from taking time to work for a big display.
Some funny things take place at fairs. Two gentlemen were competing for the prize on the best heard of cattle. One of them made free to suggest three judges and the other consented to the selection of all of them. Then when the fellow who selected the judges failed to get the prize he kicked all the same as a boy steer of his own raising and raised a great wall.
The display in the pavilion was excellent as it was, but it would have been much better with favorable weather.
The ladies horseback riding was excellent, there being eight contestants for the prize. Mrs. Stackholder took first prize and Miss Merchant, of North Yamhill, second, which seemed to give general satisfaction.
When two or more undertake to ride the same horse at the same time some body must invariably ride behind. This is a rule that all who compete for premiums at fairs will do well to remember.
The ball game on Saturday between our boys and the Lafayette nine was close enough to be interesting, the score standing 4 to 6 in favor of the latter. One or two costly errors on the part of the home team lost them the game. Both clubs acted the part of gentlemen all through, there being no disgraceful wrangles as is often the case. The game between Dundee and Newberg was easily won by the latter.
The general opinion seems to be that it will be better to hold the fair earlier in the season in the future as a better fruit display can be made, and a collision with a rain storm is less likely to occur. One thing is certain, the weather hit us hard this year and it was really surprising to see as many out on Thursday as appeared on the grounds.
It would be just as well for the credit of the association if the ball throwing and cane racket devices for harvesting the nickles of the boys, were given a wide berth in the future. The revenue derived from these things are no compensation for the discredit brought on the association for allowing such games of chance as the town will not allow inside the corporation.
J. C. Cooper and Judge Galloway, of McMinnville, were down with their families. With favorable weather the upper part of the county would have been well represented.
Several good sheep and a few good hogs were on exhibition.
The Sheridan boys took first prize in the hand contest and went home happy. They boys were so close behind them that they felt quite uncomfortable until the decision was rendered.
Some of the boys are of the opinion that it is more satisfactory in the end to pay at the gate than to climb over the high fence and then pay double fare.
The poultry show was the best ever made here. Beside our home breeders who showed some fine birds, Mr. Sloan of Forest Grove, made a fine exhibit of White and Brown Leghorns, Plymouth Rocks, Indian Games, Silver Spangled Hamburgs, Silver and Golden Wyandottes and White Faced Black Spanish.
Mrs. Mary L. Hoskins took the prize churn offered by W. C. Kruger for the best five pounds of butter.
Miss Merchant, of North Yamhill, Mrs. George Olds, of McMinnville, and Miss Ross, of Prince Edward Island, Canada, who is here visiting with Miss Ada Howard, the music teacher, acted as judges on babies.
