ONE OF THE BREASTPLATES.

Manufacturing works at Emeryville, or B street station, the last suburban stop on the Berkeley railway. Just as the train stopped two men "covered" the special bearers with revolvers, grabbed the cash, jumped off into a buggy and escaped. So much the telegraph has told, but there are additional and curious particulars.

Three hours later the buggy was found in the ditch and the other outer clothing and the robbers had worn as disguises; also lemons and other materials for the rapid removal of smut from the face, for the robbers were blacked to look like coal heavers.

But what excited most astonishment were the coats of mail found in the buggy. These were breastplates strong enough to turn a pistol ball of 45-caliber. Each was found to fit snugly over the chest, being made of iron plates, each one an inch thick and fitted with strings for tying. There was also a heavy rubber life preserver to protect the abdomen, and it was so tough that a pistol bullet would not penetrate it. The robbers had cut these things off in their haste, as they also had their overalls.

Mr. Gillson had recovered himself in time to rush to the door and see several shots. One of the robbers fell, but if hit he was not badly hurt, as he clambered into the buggy, which was driven off at a rapid rate. There was of course a fine commotion on the train—women screaming and fainting and men shouting, "Don't shoot!" The comedy of it was that there was a big picnic party on the train, everybody thought it was only a picnic row, and no one tried to stop the men in the buggy.

The theory of the police is that the robbers drove with all haste to the first secluded spot and there cached their plunder, then stripped off their disguises, washed and sauntered into town like innocent pedestrians. So all the boys in that region are searching for the hidden plunder. Be that theory true or false, the robbers certainly took big chances, got away with \$15,000 and at last accounts had not been captured.

A Second Lieutenant Anastay.

The Baroness Dellard was murdered in broad day, in her apartments in Paris, by Lieutenant Anastay, who secured access to the house in the garb of an ordinary man of business. It was a sensational case, exciting all France, and scarcely was Anastay's guillotine when Mme. Lecocq, a superannuated servant, had a narrow escape from the same fate. A stranger entered, begged for food and received it. She was then seized by her uninvited guest, who squeezed her throat until she came out of her nostrils. The stranger then placed the old woman, who was in an unconscious condition, on her bed, and plied the room. He was caught in getting away with a purse containing a small sum of money and a gold watch and chain. The victim was for two hours in a semi-comatose condition, but eventually regaining consciousness she tottered to her feet and shouted for help, which soon came. She stated to the police that she had no knowledge whatever of the would be murderer, who offered her an envelope containing a religious picture.

In 1891 there were 397 cars in hops in Polk county and the yield was 2,334 bales. This year the acreage is 630 acres and the yield 3,335 bales. This increase in acreage is nearly 100 per cent., while the increase in yield is only about 50 per cent. Two reasons are given for this: First, the small yield of many of the new years, and the shortness of the crop this year. In some places this shortage amounts to fully 50 per cent. less than last year. The quality of the crop in the county is better than ever before.

A German shoemaker named Rudolph Mann at Phoenix, A. T., during the night broke a pitcher to pieces, and with the jagged fragments cut his throat. With the blood flowing from him in streams he was carried through the hall to the porch, and deliberately precipitated himself to the ground, sixteen feet below. In spite of the added injuries from striking a stump the man must have been still conscious and intent on self-destruction, for he reeled off to a ditch, where he was found, in which he seems to have intentionally thrust and kept his head until unconscious or dead.

Seattle Shippers Organize a Transportation Bureau.

MARRIAGES AND DIVORCES.

Chinaman Murders a Mexican Boy and Throws His Body in a Cesspool.

Sacramento has voted \$100,000 in bonds for levee improvements.

During the year 1891 there were 2,110 marriages and 458 divorces in Oregon.

The City and Citizens' Water Companies at Los Angeles have combined.

The Star group of mines at Hailey, Idaho, have been sold to Salt Lake capitalists.

The grain warehouse of the Pacific Milling Company at Tucson, A. T., has been destroyed by fire.

A mountain of carbonate of zinc has been discovered near Hillsboro, N. M., the ore of which is worth about \$35 per ton.

Silver salmon are now very plentiful at Yaquina Bay, Or., and are being caught with trolling lines in great numbers.

Dick Horn, alias "Fox," shot Joe Lynch in the stomach at Wellington, Nev. The trouble was over a game of cards.

The captain of the clipper schooner Agnes MacDonald at Victoria, B. C., has issued a challenge for a race to the Sandwich Islands and back for \$3,000.

Professor Barnard at the Lick Observatory has discovered by the aid of photography a faint comet. This is the first discovery of a comet by this means.

Santa and Evans are believed to have located near Watts Valley, fifteen miles north of Sampson Flat, where provisions for the winter have been sent into them.

The Supreme Court of Idaho has unanimously sustained the constitutionality of the State test oath law. This will prevent the Mormons from voting this year.

Mill owners in Washington and Oregon, outside of Portland, are organizing for mutual benefit and protection. They claim they are making flour without a profit.

Chung Yung, the supposed murderer of the Spanish boy, Fernando (Julian), at Los Angeles, whose body was found in a cesspool, has been captured and placed in prison.

A Ruiz, a Mexican rancher at San Diego, attempted to get possession of his wife's property by swearing that she was insane, but he landed in jail on a charge of perjury.

The advance guard of Chief Engineer Kennedy's corps has arrived at Palermo, Cal., and will at once commence the preliminary survey for the San Francisco and Great Salt Lake railroad.

The chief hop buyers and the brewers of the Northwest are now coming into the grove in Washington believe prices will reach 4 cents, and those who can are holding for better prices than they now receive.

About twenty shippers of Seattle have organized a transportation bureau to protect each other against unjust discrimination by transportation companies and for the protection and development of the shipping interests of the city.

On opening the schoolhouse of the Gallagher district, in Mason Valley, Nev., after the summer vacation it was discovered the bees had taken possession of the children's desks, and about 300 pounds of honey were taken from them.

Northern Pacific railway officials announce that arrangements have been effected whereby the Atlantic steamers Alaska and Arizona will be brought to Tacoma for service next season on the Northern Pacific and Oriental steamship line.

Charles F. Blum at Albuquerque, N. M., while suffering from fever got up from bed and, taking a razor from his trunk, cut his throat, severing the jugular vein, and then cut a horrible gash across the abdomen. He next got a pistol from his trunk, and shot himself three times, twice in the mouth and once in the lower wound in his neck.

The 400 Indians on the Grande Ronde reservation originally represented the following tribes: Umpqua, Calappaia, Oregon City, Molalla, Rogue River, Cow Creek, Silette, Klickitat, Tualatin and a few Columbia Rivers, but there is now no distinct tribe, owing to intermarriage. Several Indians claim to be centenarians. The agency is well conducted, and Agent Lamson is a great favorite with his wards.

N. H. Dodson, a well-known attorney of San Diego, has been horsewhipped by Jennie Page, a young lady. Miss Page is a niece of Dodson, and took this method of resenting the insulting remarks she claims were made by him concerning her. The horsewhipping took place in front of the Vidette office, where Miss Page is employed as a compositor. A large crowd witnessed the scene, but no one interfered until the police arrived. Dodson bears marks of a severe whipping.

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PERSONAL MENTION.

The Oldest Living American Actress—The Wintergreen Club of Boston—Max O'Rell.

Prof. W. G. Sumner of Yale, the well-known political economist, will not return to New Haven this fall, as he first intended, but will remain in Europe until midwinter.

One of Boston's clubs, the Wintergreen, is composed of women all confessedly over 30. Mrs. Mary A. Livermore, who would doubtless own up to a decade or two more, is one of its leading spirits.

Robert M. McLane, ex-Minister to France under President Cleveland, who went abroad early in the summer in feeble health caused by an attack of pneumonia, has returned to Baltimore entirely recovered.

Col. Eli Lilly, President of the Commercial Club of Indianapolis, has consented to act as Chairman of the General Committee to prepare for the national encampment of the A. O. U. W., which meets in that city in 1893.

The oldest living American actresses are Clara Fisher Maeder, born in 1811, and Mrs. John Drew, who is seven years younger. Mrs. Drew appeared on the stage a babe of 9 months, and has acted ever since. Mrs. Maeder was on the stage from 1817 to 1880, and then went into retirement.

Alcegar Charles Swinburne, the most prominent candidate for the post of laureate of Great Britain, was born in London April 5, 1837. He is an acknowledged master of English rhythm; but the fact that his fame is largely based on the boldness with which he has trodden on forbidden ground may stand in the way of his selection for the position.

Max O'Rell, who is lecturing in Australia, announces his intention of returning home and "settling down" for life after this last trip. Asked whether "home" he meant Paris, he replied in the negative. "In Paris everything is changed. We go there every year to look around, but when one has formed a circle of literary, social and artistic friends, as I have in London—well, that is home."

While Prof. Huxley was staying at a seaside resort in North Wales he was approached by a Liverpool evangelist, who thrust a tract into his hand with the inquiry, "Have you got your soul saved?" "I have sufficient respect for genuine religion to be revolted by blasphemous impertinences," said the scientist in relating the anecdote afterward. "So I answered somewhat sternly, 'That is my business,' and tore up the tract."

EDUCATIONAL.

Number of Teachers Employed in the Public Schools of the United States—Golden Rod.

About 175 new students are registered at Vassar College this year.

The golden rod has been adopted as the flower of the Chicago University.

Of the students graduated at Yale University since 1701, 7,526 are dead and 7,520 living.

During the last year Harvard University has received in gifts and bequests over \$500,000.

The Constitution of Louisiana permits women to hold any office connected with public education.

One hundred and two girls were enrolled at the opening of the Allentown Female College, Pa.

Baltimore proposes to open a school of pedagogy, with a principal drawing a salary of \$3,500 at its head.

Thirty young women students have entered Yale this fall. The Yale males are said to be in quite a stew about it.

It is expected that 1,000 students will attend the new Chicago University this year, probably one-third of them being women.

The enrollment this year at the University of Illinois at Champaign is 623, compared with 498 on the opening day last year.

England with ninety-four universities has 2,723 more professors and 51,814 more students than the 390 universities of the United States.

New York city is to introduce the kindergarten as a part of the public-school system. The
