Who Were They?

In this issue of the GRAPHIC will be found an article entitled, "Relics of Cliff Dwellers," taken from the Art Catalogue, of the Minneapolis Exposition.

While in Minneapolis last September I had the pleasure of visiting the exposition and seeing this, the most interesting collection of prehistoric relics that has ever been discovered in this country. I spent three hours time looking through the collection and then left to take the train for home, wishing that I had more time to look and learn. While looking on these mummies that have been so well preserved that even the color of the hair is yet easily distinguished, one could not keep from constantly wondering who these people were and where they came from, for the mystery of the thing is what adds interest to the collection. The hair of the head being soft and brown, is ample proof that they were not Indians, and the Indians of that region of the country have not even a tradition of the existence of such a race of people. To add to the attractiveness of the exhibition, art collector Smith brought back with him a sufficient amount of the stone to build two or three small houses, perfect imitations of those he found in Mancos Canyon. As nearly a perfect reproduction of one of the canyons was made as could be, and these houses were built on the sloping sides under the over hanging precipices. The exploring party brought back with them the bones they used and three of these added to the novelty of the scene. Mr. Smith will probably take the collection to the World's Fair. Any of our readers who may go will do well to hunt it up, as it will be worth a trip to Chicago to see it alone.

Educational Meeting.
The educational meeting held at Friends church on last Saturday night was well attended and was full of interest to those who are in any way connected with our educational institutions. E. H. Woodward was elected president and Mrs. J. J. Jessup secretary. The principal address of the evening was the address by Dr. Jessup, the subject being "Denominational Schools, their Place and Function." Dr. Jessup was one of the first to advocate the establishment of a school at Newberg eight years ago, to be under the management of Friends church, and was largely instrumental in founding what is now Pacific College.

He was made the solicitor for funds for building at that time, and his appointment proved to be a good one, as he raised much more money than was expected for the beginning. His address on the above subject was well prepared and full of encouragement to the church and the public to properly sustain Pacific College, as well as being full of encouragement to our young people to attend and get the benefits of the college. Rev. J. H. Douglas followed with a few remarks appropriate to the occasion after which Rev. Thomas Brown, pastor of the church, spoke on "The Value of Higher Schools to the Community." While his address was necessarily short owing to lack of time, his points were well made and his address was well received. This meeting was an important one and will no doubt give new impetus to educational work in the church.
