Teachers' Institute. The teachers' local institute which occurred at this place on Saturday, the 10th was very interesting as well as beneficial to those present. Prof. Holson was elected chairman of the convention, and the house being called to order, President Whittaker, of Willamette University, conducted the devotional service. A very able paper on "Methods in Language Work," was read and discussed, after which Pres. Whittaker gave some practical thoughts on that subject. He clearly illustrated that absolute thoroughness in the primary grades was the true foundation for true scholarship and "glorious manhood."

The afternoon session opened with an instructive paper on "Methods in Composition," by Miss E. W. Hinchman, and a lively discussion followed. The old method of composition writing was condemned and the later one of leaving a subject thoroughly studied and the child knows something about the topic before writing about it, was approved. Miss Macy read a "Review of Tennyson," which increased our interest much in pure literature. We were all led to admire the simple life of this greatest of modern poets and to feel that "England's loss is ours." A practical application of interest in Tennyson was introduced by having each teacher give a quotation from his writings. Miles Reese discussed the subject of "Teaching Literature in Elementary Schools," and we will all do more of it in the future I am sure.

It was decided to hold a local institute at this place each month and while those who attend receive much benefit from

these meetings, it would surely do much more good if the patrons would attend and take more interest.

Road Meeting. A meeting of the farmers from up the valley met at the Grange hall on last Saturday to discuss matters of interest to themselves with reference to public roads and road laws. The meeting was called to order by Mr. Harger. J. C. Nelson was elected chairman and J. P. Thomas secretary of the meeting. General discussion on various subjects followed and the following resolutions were adopted.

1. That we oppose any legislation permitting road districts or counties incurring bonded indebtedness for building or maintaining roads. That we are opposed to any legislation raising the present limit of taxation.

2. That we are in favor of expending the money collected for road purposes in the district where such a tax is collected.

3. That we favor such legislation as will provide for neighborhood roads which shall consist of a right of way and the right of the public to improve and maintain such roads by volunteer work, but for the maintenance of which the county shall not be responsible.

4. That we instruct our representatives in the legislature to support the passage of a bill for utilizing convict labor on our public roads.

The next meeting will be held at the same place on Saturday Dec. 24th. Such gatherings by the farmers ought to prove very beneficial and should be largely attended. Men in all lines of commercial business meet together to discuss matters of direct interest to themselves and why should not the farmers do the same.

Our Public School. Some of our readers seem to have got a wrong impression from what we said a couple of weeks ago with reference to the condition of affairs in the public school and ask, "what is the matter with the Graphic and the public school?" No dozen people in the town have had as many flattering things to say of our schools as the Graphic has, and we presume that if we had continued to say these nice things without ever hinting that anything could be made better, fond parents would have wrapped their cloaks of contentment a little closer about them and thanked the Lord that their children were not as others were. But the moment the Graphic dares to hint that there are some things said on the play ground that ought not to be said in the hearing of school children or anybody else, hands are held up in horror and the Graphic has a grievance is imagined. It is passing strange that one can't suggest even to his friend that he might make some changes for the better without being accused of being his enemy. We believe as we have said in the past, that anyone wanting to place their children in a school where the moral influences are good, will not find a better school in the northwest than Newberg public school. The corps of teachers we regard as excellent, and believe that they manifest a deep interest in the welfare of the children. We also believe that the board of directors as well as the patrons of the school are anxious that the interest of the pupils should be guarded on every hand, but we also believe, in fact we know that profanity and loose language in the school has been on the increase for the past two or three years and that more close watching along this line is needed, first at home on the part of the parents, then on the school grounds. The past reputation of the school should not be supposed to be sufficient for the present, neither should a few in the school be allowed to remain to the injury of the whole school. If there are those who are so far gone that they can't regard the laws of our land, suspension should be resorted to and if that won't answer, expulsion will do the work. There is absolutely no excuse for the use of profanity, the law of the land forbids it, and it should not be allowed on the public school grounds.

We have too much interest in our schools to sit idly by and keep silence, hence we say these things regardless of what some may think or say.
