LETTER FROM E. ROBINSON.

WHITTIER, Cal., Feb. 3, 1893.

EDITORS GRAPHIC:—In my last I told you something of the "Santa Anas." We have been at this place a month now and so far have not been troubled with them at all. This seems to be one of the most sheltered places from them that I have heard of, but there seems to be so much sectional feeling in southern California, every little town jealous of its neighbor, that it takes some time to get to the real facts about other places. Whittier is very pleasantly situated on a south western slope at the foot of the Puente Hills and in elevation is from the level of the valley to 200 feet above. Six years ago it was a sheep ranch, then came the "boom" and for the last two or three years it has been nearly dead, now is beginning to show signs of going forward, several new houses being built, etc.

The water supply is obtained partly from the Puente Hills from a tunnel and partly by pumping from the East Whittier company's ditch which runs through the lower part of town. During the winter the water from the hills is used entirely in the Whittier Water company's system; in the summer when water is needed for irrigation, the ditch water is used principally. The former is hard the latter soft. The ditch is fed by artesian wells. Possibly in the future more water will be developed, under the present system it is rather expensive for irrigation.

This seems to be a very pleasant place to spend the winter and from all we can learn the summers are generally pleasant also, being tempered by a daily sea breeze, the ocean being visible 18 miles distant. We visited Pasadena one day and were favorably impressed with its location but there is more wind there than here. I think many desirable locations can be found in this state for homes, but none better than Newberg, Oregon, that is to say we have disadvantages at Newberg which we don't have here, but they have others here which we don't have there, so it is largely a matter of personal choice between a few minor drawbacks. The disadvantages spoken of in either state are insignificant when compared with disadvantages east of the Rocky mountains in our estimation.

We have had beautiful weather while here until the past week when we had a heavy rain, it is fine and sunny again now. One or two more similar rains this spring will secure a good crop in Whittier. The town appears to be somewhat less than Newberg in size and very much less in commercial importance. Newberg seems to have been pretty well represented in Whittier this winter so far as numbers are concerned.

This coast from Tacoma to San Diego has a very fair climate and room for many million more people. The prosperity of each part effects the whole and if people could only drop this sectional feeling all over the coast it would be much better all along. Yours Resp., EDMUND ROBINSON.
