Mr. Haskell suddenly complained of feeling tired, sat down and then fell forward. The boy called a neighbor and Dr. Littlefield was hurriedly sent for, who did what he could to resuscitate him but without avail, as his life had gone out. Mrs. Haskell was telegraphed for and she and her daughter came up on the evening train. The remains were taken to Portland for burial on Wednesday afternoon's train.

The deceased was born in Washington D. C., sixty-four years ago last January. He was a jolly, good natured old man, whom we were always glad to meet and who showed his pleasantness, and we were shocked to hear of his sudden death.
