MRS. SARAH E. SMITH.

Sarah E. Smith was born in Morrow County, Ohio, Dec. 13, 1842. Was married to John T. Smith at New Providence, Iowa, Sep. 20, 1860. Died of Lagrippe at Newberg, Oregon, March 20, 1893.

The death of Mrs. Smith, the wife of our fellow townsman, J. T. Smith, which took place on last Monday, at 4 p. m., has probably caused more universal sorrow among our people than any death that has ever occurred in Newberg.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith came to this community seventeen years ago, being among the first of the immigration of the latter years to this part of Oregon, and were identified with all the earlier and more trying efforts along the line of moral, religious, educational and financial development, which have made this a community so desirable that many of the better element of society are constantly being attracted to the place. While their lot at that early day was not so easy and pleasant, as has fallen to many of those who have come later, they were even then always cheerful and happy, and right well many of us can remember having taken the first meal in this valley at their home and having, as strangers in a strange land, been cheered and encouraged by their kind words of sympathy and their many self sacrificing efforts on our behalf.

During all these years of development they have also kept abreast of the times and have ever been found ready to do their part, where constant activity and steady solid work has been so necessary. Whenever an orphan child has needed befriending, and in sickness and death in the community, when assistance has been needed, their hands have ever been ready and willing to do the right thing at the right time.

Mrs. Smith has been in business in Newberg for several years, and her business relations with the public have always been pleasant and agreeable, as her many customers who will read the notice of her death with tearful eyes, will testify. Her life was that of an earnest, consistent, christian, and as for her future existence, her sorrowing friends have no fears. We know we voice the feelings of everyone when we say, the sympathies of

the entire community are with the bereaved family.

The funeral was conducted from the residence on Wednesday at 11 a. m. The memorial service will be preached at Friends church on next Sunday at 11 a. m., by the pastor, Rev. Thomas C. Brown.
