W. C. T. U. Meeting.
The meeting of the W. C. T. U. held on the 12th inst., was very interesting and the attendance good. The time was devoted to a literary program. After the usual opening service, consisting of a Bible reading and prayer, Mr. Bushell, of Tempe, presented a paper on "The Union," and presented and addressed the union. From late statistics he gave the amount of money expended for spirits excluding wine and cider to be \$1,223,460,752. This sum is so immense we can hardly comprehend it, but we know it would make many happy and comfortable homes where it now destroys them. The Whisky Case.
On Tuesday of this week W. H. Caine, who for some years has been running a drugstore in the west end of town, was arrested, charged with violating the city ordinance by selling liquor. The charge was made by C. B. Clement and Caine when brought before his honor, Judge Howard, pleaded "guilty," but, as the judge proceeded to fine him \$50.00 and costs, Mr. Caine moved to reconsider and entered a plea of "not guilty." He was then required to furnish \$200 bonds to insure his appearance in court on Wednesday at 1 o'clock. This was done, one of the Dunbar boys and Jackson, who runs a grocery on Main street signing his bond. He was no sooner released, however, than he was rearrested on a similar charge, preferred by James Vestal. Pleading "not guilty" to this, he gave Mr. Plummer and J. L. Myers as his bond and was again released. At the trial on Wednesday a clear case was made against him and the jury, after only a very few minutes deliberation, brought in a verdict of "guilty as charged." Judge Howard deferred sentence and adjourned court till 8 a. m. yesterday.

Wednesday evening, after court adjourned charges were preferred against Clement for selling whisky by Denny Myers. This case, however, seems to have been a clear case of spivework, and it is even intimated that it was done through fear that Clement might tell of some other crooked or unlawful transactions which he knew of. Clement gave bond in the sum of \$500 to appear before the grand jury at the next term of the district court.

On Thursday morning the second charge was tried before Judge Howard after which two more charges were preferred against Caine and immediately tried. Judge Howard, at the close, fined Caine \$100 and costs on the first count and \$20 and costs on each of the three subsequent counts, the whole aggregating something more than \$290. It seems to be a pretty general opinion that Caine drank no more than he deserved, as even drinking men have been heard to say that his place was worse than an open saloon. If this is the case, considering the temperance sentiment of the town, it is the duty of every law abiding citizen of Newberg to see that he either shuts up shop or does business on the square. And as for one or two other places where gambling or drinking are said to have been carried on, they should be treated in the same way. A too lax sentiment has already very nearly resulted in the ruin of some of the young men of the town, and the time has come for the majority to assert their rights. If men cannot live without gambling or selling liquor contrary to law or selling cigarettes to minors, contrary to law, they should be made to understand that they had better go where there are more of their kind.

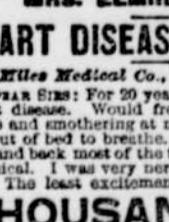
