WORMS IN THE VINEYARDS.

Governor Richards Issues a Procla-
mation Against Importing
Sheep Into Montana.

Salt Lake has voted \$25,000 in school
bonds.

Nevada farmers are pleased with the
crop outlook in the State.

Another prospector at San Diego
claims to have found the Pegleg mine.
His name is John Ingram, and his age
is 63.

There is much sympathy at Spokane
for Mr. Cannon, whose banking house
has just failed. The assets will cover all
liabilities.

A vast deposit of borate of lime has
been discovered in the Calico Mountains.
The find is thought to be worth millions
of dollars.

The Naval Board at Mare Island in
making their report have pronounced
the Monitor to be all that the con-
tract required.

The citizens of Ashland are making a
determined effort to raise the \$12,000
which is required to insure the location
of a branch of the Portland University
there.

The Los Angeles Times will put in a
new printing press this week, and
will introduce seven linotype type-
setting machines, the first to appear in
California.

We wonder, says the Yuma Sentinel,
if there is another town outside of
Yuma in the universe where any of its
citizens are charged from 50 cents to \$1
for drinking water in a saloon or barber
shop?

The Bradstreet agency reports eight-
een failures in the Pacific Coast States
and Territories for the past week, as
compared with fourteen for the previous
week and ten for the corresponding
week of 1892.

A large draft of seamen from the
Mare Island naval rendezvous will be
sent to Honolulu by the next steamer
to reinforce the crews of the United
States ship Adams and the cruiser Boston,
now there.

The Federal Trade at Los Angeles
failed to make out a case for deportation
in the Ah Yung arrest, owing to the fact
that the District Attorney did not show
that the Chinaman was unregistered.
The Trade is determined that a case
shall be properly brought before the courts.

Not since the memorial disaster of
1880 has there been such a loss of life as
during the present year along the Col-
umbia river fisheries. Fifteen fisher-
men have been drowned since April 10,
and fifty-seven boats have capsized.
The uncertainty of the tides ever since
the season started has made the river
languorous for the boats.

Governor Richards of Montana has
issued a proclamation prohibiting the
importation of sheep into Montana from
Oregon, California, Nevada, Washing-
ton, Wyoming, Idaho, Utah, Colorado
or New Mexico, except upon the certifi-
cate of the State Veterinarian that the
sheep have been inspected and found
free of any infectious or contagious
disease.

Worms have again appeared in the
vineyards west of Fresno, Cal., by mil-
lions, and in several localities people
are fighting them with reays of Chinese,
who work night and day. The worms
have been found in some places several
acres have been stripped of leaves in a
few hours as if a band of sheep had
gone through the vineyards. It is
thought the pest will be cleaned out.

The McKinney will case at Stockton,
Cal. has been dropped. A motion for a
nonsuit was agreed to by the defendant,
a colored woman, who swore she married
McKinney in 1878, when the records
would prove that she had married a
man named Nicholas in 1879. There
was every evidence of conspiracy to
obtain the McKinney money, and it is
possible a conspiracy case may be
formed.

Penitentiary convicts are now making
about 40,000 brick a day. The Salem
Stateman says: "It is a pity they
could not make enough for the State
to be used in public buildings and ad-
ditions provided for by the last Legis-
lature."

The cases against the trappers of the
Columbia river have for the second time
in two years fallen to the ground, and
Hon. C. W. Fulton and his brother won
two cases recently for the defense, one
after the other. The Prosecuting At-
torney declared he would never again
bring a charge against a trapper or a
gilnet fisherman. He declared it
utterly useless to try to secure a con-
viction, and stated that it would never
be possible for the State to win a case
of the kind when the lawyers so mixed the
jurisdiction in civil and criminal cases
that they were unable to agree on any-
thing. Mr. Fulton produced certificates
held by both defendants, and argued
that the laws of Congress giving Oregon
jurisdiction in civil and criminal cases
to the Washington shore of the Colum-
bia only applied to the service of pro-
cesses and to crimes committed on a
floating boat or other craft and not to
jurisdiction in civil and criminal cases
on the Washington side. He claimed in
addition that, if a Clatsop county jury
pronounced jurisdiction over Washing-
ton fishtraps, the State of Washington
could with just as much reason levy
on and control the Union Pacific wharves
that run out toward the middle channel
from Astoria. Judge Cleveland, being
powerless to instruct the jury on the
jurisdiction question, declined to in-
structing either jury, and the Fulton
secured acquittal for every one of their
clients. The question unfortunately is
no nearer settlement than ever. The
Sheriff of the county and all the de-
puties are denouncing Fish Commissioner
Crawford of Washington for what they
claim is flagrant dereliction of duty in
favor of the trappers.

NATIONAL CAPITAL.

Secretary Carlisle has appointed
Worthington Ford of Brooklyn, N. Y.,
chief of the bureau of statistics in the
Treasury Department. During the last
Cleveland administration Ford served as
chief of the bureau of statistics of the
Department of State. Mr. Ford is worth
nearly \$1,000,000.

The experts employed under the di-
rection of the Congressional Commit-
tee investigating the methods of ad-
ministering business in the executive de-
partments began work last week. They
will first take up the business methods
of the Treasury. It will take perhaps
two years to do the work.

The officials of the War Department
protest that the recent increase of the
military force at Chicago has nothing to
do with the closing of the World's Fair,
but notwithstanding this denial there is
reason to believe trouble is anticipated
if an attempt is made to carry out the
construction of the law given by the
United States Courts.

The Star says that President Cleve-
land has told members of Congress that
under no circumstances would there be
an issue of bonds unless especially au-
thorized by Congress. The administration
he said, was not responsible for the
present financial situation, and it lays
with Congress and not the administra-
tion to find a remedy for it.

Plans are being made by Secretary
Hoke Smith for an extensive summer
tour through the West. These plans
are not fully developed, and the time of
the tour is therefore indeterminate.
He will, however, visit points in Indian
Territory and then proceed to California,
returning by the route of the Northern
Pacific railroad. Mrs. Smith has
been appointed to accompany him on his
travels.

During the first three months of the
present administration ended June 3 the
total number of fourth-class postmasters
appointed was 6,537, of which 4,672 were
to fill vacancies caused by resignations
and death and 1,865 by removals. Dur-
ing the corresponding period of the pre-
vious administration the total number
appointed was 8,228, or 1,696 more than
were appointed during the first three
months. Of these 2,553 were to fill va-
cancies caused by resignations and death
and 5,667 by removals. The number of
appointments made on resignations was
2,015 greater during the first quarter of
the administration than during the last
quarter, and the number made on removals
was 3,502 less during Cleveland's first quarter
than during Harrison's.

Secretary Gresham has received infor-
mation from Minister Blount that he
wants the conclusion that he is prepared
to endorse all that has been done in Ha-
waii, and that he is now strongly in-
clined to recommend at least the estab-
lishment of a United States protectorate
over the Hawaiian Islands. The Secre-
tary is also in official ignorance of the
reported interference of Clats Spreckels
in behalf of the restoration of monarchy
by the provisional government of money
advanced by him to the late monarch.

The Secretary is, of course, in receipt of
information from Blount that he does
not feel justified in publishing the facts
he has no hesitation in denying the ac-
curacy of the above report.

WORLD'S FAIR NOTES.

The ex-Gladstone has been using at
Hawarden is to be on exhibition at the
World's Fair.

Florida, somewhat late it would seem,
is appropriating \$25,000 for State use at
the World's Fair on condition that the
railroads give a like sum.

The foreign commissioners at the
World's Fair propose to have an inde-
pendent board of jurors and to issue di-
plomas on their own account.

The World's Fair managers have fig-
ured expenses down to \$200,000 a day,
whereas the daily average revenue from
admissions and concessions is about \$50,
600.

A majority of the United States Cir-
cuit Court has decided the World's Fair
must close Sunday. Judges Wood and
Jenkins ordered that an injunction be
issued restraining the officers from open-
ing the gates of the fair grounds. Judge
Grosscup dissented, recommending that
the injunction applied for by the United
States District Attorney be not granted.
The decision of Judges Wood and Jen-
kins, though reaching the same point in
the end, takes this action on widely diverg-
ing grounds, as dissenting opinion dif-
fers radically from both. The court-
rooms were crowded when the decision
was read. Judge Wood read his own
opinion, in which he concluded that
Jackson Park was lawfully devoted for
exposition purposes, and that the expo-
sition had been in fact turned over to
the control of the Federal government
by the local corporation, and that its
control was therefore as absolute as if
control of the Federal building. He
held that the Sunday-closing rule, hav-
ing once been passed by the local direc-
tory and approved by the National Com-
mission, former bodies could not change
it. Regarding the case before Judge
Stein of the State court, he held it was
no bar to the proceedings, because it is
impossible to say that the government
must in equity yield to a State court.

A man named Arnold and Harlow
Higginbotham, who secured the conces-
sion as official and only photographers
on the grounds at a salary of \$2,000 a
year and 10 per cent on all work, which
meant about \$25,000, have ruined them-
selves by officiousness in getting them-
selves tangled up with the council of ad-
ministration, and will probably be dis-
ciplined. They went so far as to de-
clare that representatives of illustrated news-
papers could not make sketches on the
grounds, and the other day one of these
artists was arrested and taken before
Arnold, who constituted himself a Magis-
trate for the occasion and utterly ig-
nored the laws issued by the artist by
Director-General Davis. When the in-
formation of this reached the Director-
General he was wrath, and the matter
was referred to the council of adminis-
tration, which will probably issue an order
of photographs taken from the negatives
in the German section of the fine-art gallery.
The United States government signed an
agreement that all negatives of photo-
graphs or other exhibits should be re-
turned to the commissioners. This agree-
ment, however, had no effect on Arnold,
and the matter was laid before the coun-
cil of administration.

AGRICULTURAL.

A Strong Plea for System
in Farming.

SOME WHOLESOME TRUTHS.

Many Farmers Never Dream of System
in Farming.

Season—Advice.

Drifting, drifting, drifting! Floating
along with the current; dropping out
the ruts; slipping into the paths pointed
out by existing circumstances! This is
as well as the great mass of farmers mov-
ing; this is the cause of so many failures
of "straightened circumstances," of
mediocre results and almost fruitless

"humdrum," existence so many realize,
barren of satisfactory results, fruitless

there who never dreams of planning for
more than the single season, while there
are others who plan conditions as they
find them to dictate their course of ac-
tion. One will go out over his fields in
the spring, select a little spot of an acre
or two where the soil is fertile and the
water is good, and plant a small crop of
"guess I will put a little corn here."

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
