FROM ELWOOD WERNER.

MEHLAKATIA, Alaska, Aug. 10, 1893.
We arrived here safely on the 8th at 4 p. m., after a pleasant sail of four days and nights, starting from Tacoma on the 4th at midnight. We first stopped at Port Townsend a few hours, while the ship was loading on freight we took the town in, going upon vacant houses and long faces. "Hard times," was the cry. At noon the fifth we sailed out for Victoria, B. C., where we landed at 3 p. m. Some of us took part of the town in. Here we found times much livelier. Business moving along the old English style. The principal street was strung along for half a mile with fine vehicles of different varieties ready for service for any one who wished a pleasure ride over the city. Everett and myself visited the Bishops Palace to see two boys who are there from Douglas Island, Alaska, receiving a thorough Catholic education. At 6:30 we sailed for Departure Bay where we landed at daylight the next day, (Sunday) where we remained until 3 p. m., loading on coal. No churches that we heard of at this place on Vancouver Island. We all passed off the time pleasantly as we could view the surroundings for two or three miles away from the ship but saw nothing different from the natural scenery of the grand old state of Oregon, except the natural gravelly roads which never get muddy. The soil of this part of the island seems wholly of that character. At the time stated we bid adieu to civilization and sailed out for our northern place. For nearly three hundred miles we sailed along this island viewing as much as we could the grand scenery on both sides of the broad waters of the Gulf of Georgia. Soon daylight faded away and we all retired to our several abodes, nothing to disturb our repose, save the revolving motion of the powerful propeller, but the dull rumbling and constant thud of which we soon became accustomed to, and rested sweetly over the deep blue water of the Pacific. Just after breakfast or about nine o'clock next morning we came to the swelling waters of Queen Charlotte Sound.

The next subject of conversation was who was to be sick. The determination of all seemed to be that they would not succumb to that awful feeling, but it was not long till a half dozen of the forty passengers, were out and gone to some secluded spot to seek relief. Three out of our little company of five did not appear at the dinner table. Everett and I were on time, but toward evening we all met again and every single one denied being sea sick. "Actions speak louder than words." Our food was always good. If I were to relate the varieties and all the luxuries set before us it would require too much time and printer's ink, so we will leave that for the readers to thank their lips on. We had rain during the day. At 9 a. m. of the 8th, we came to Dixon's Entrance, where we felt but little sea swell. Three hours later we arrived at the custom house on Mar's Island where the anchor was thrown out, the first stop we made for forty-eight hours. Here the custom officer made his appearance on the ship for an hour, after which we sailed out for our place of abode, New Melakatia two and a half hours' ride, at which place we arrived at 4 p. m. The sun shone out brightly for the first time since leaving Departure Bay, which made things look more lovely. We were soon on shore and all seemed delighted at the appearance of the surroundings, and Mattie declared she would be the last one to get homesick. We told her it was a sure indication to be the first, but we will let time settle this matter.

Everybody on Annette Island seemed to be busy earning fish. Mr. Duncan said they had 13,000 fish that should be cooked before dark. That is a big catch. We soon had our baggage taken to our present abode, a house of 28 rooms, and some of them large ones. Our sitting room or parlor is 18x24 feet, covered with Brussels carpet. All seemed glad to meet us, and I am sure we were glad to meet them. Some time in the future we will try and describe our surroundings.
